Air letters were first used in Nigeria by the armed forces in World War 2 but these did not include any text or indicium that were specific to Nigeria and are outside the scope of this display. In 1943 these generic air letters were made available for civilian use and there are many versions of them that were printed in West Africa (see West African Forces Air Mail Letter Cards, Air Letters & Honour Envelopes 1942-1945 by Nigel Lutwyche). This display starts with the first air letters (latterly called aerogrammes) specifically for Nigeria which were issued in December 1948 and immediately gained popular acceptance on overseas mail because the postal rate of 6d was half the first step letter rate of 1/- to British Empire destinations at that time. The rules for use of aerogrammes precluded any enclosures; if the sender was found to have done so it was diverted to surface mail unless stamps were added to bring it up to the normal air letter rate, of which I have a few examples. Air letters could be registered or sent by express mail, but such uses are unusual.

Until about 1970 all Nigerian air letters were printed in the UK. From about 1970 all printing of post-ready aerogrammes was carried out by Nigerian Security Printing and Minting Ltd (NSP&M Ltd) but an unknown number of Nigerian commercial printers also printed formula aerogrammes (without a printed Nigerian "stamp"). There was also a delivery of temporary formula aerogrammes to Nigeria in 1952 when the KGVI aerogrammes ran out and the QE2 ones were not yet ready. All such formula aerogrammes are excluded from this display.

The postal rates and stamp designs evolved in parallel with the adhesive stamps of each period, both before and after independence, but the amount of use of aerogrammes by Nigerians declined steeply in the 1980s, for no reason I know, with the result that some out of date remainder stocks were uprated by adding adhesive stamps whilst others were redenominated with handstamps as postal rates increased sharply during periods of high inflation. These uprated aerogrammes are scarce and there are probably new discoveries still to be made.

In 1947 West African Airways Corporation was set up with the express purpose of moving as much possible of the internal surface mails by air between the major cities. From October 1949 there were 1d internal air letters, later 1½d then 2d, which were usually a little cheaper than the basic surface letter rate to encourage use of this lighter, space-saving stationery. However, commercially used examples are not easy to find. There was also an official post-free air letter during the 1950s which is also scarce in non-philatelic use.

I have made extensive use of the two excellent published books on this topic: Aerogrammes of Nigeria 1948 to 2000, by Ray Harris (whose numbering system I have adopted) and The Postal stationery of Nigeria, by Peter Horlyck.

These internal aerogrammes were also used externally, uprated. The example shown here was sent from Iwo Town on 8 September 1953, very soon after the first QE2 aerogramme was issued on 1 September 1953. The airmail rate to the UK was 6d but only an extra 1½d adhesive has been used (but another could be missing). It should have gone by surface mail but there is no backstamp to show when it arrived.







The air letter shown here was posted at Zaria on 7 April 1952, reaching Offa on 15 April 1952. The internal air letter increased to 1½d on 8 April 1952, whilst this air letter was in transit. With its exact date of posting this air letter should not have been taxed, but the Zaria postmark date is very unclear and Offa post office may have been the one that added the taxe mark. There was also no obvious reason for this to be flown as both places were connected by the Kano to Lagos rail service.







These aerogrammes are scarce used post-free for their intended purpose of official internal communications. To be allowed post free they must have the cachet and counter-signature of a head of department. Two examples that lack these were sent from Ibadan on 9 May 53 and from Kaduna on 27 November 1953, both taxed 3d (double the internal air letter rate of 1½d for the public) even though the content of the November one was official business: the dates for medical exams.

These aerogrammes were also used for official business overseas, without taxation.

These two are from the Student's Advisory Committee, Lagos on 13 January 1953, to the registrar at Loughborough College franked with the London Official Paid machine on 21 January, and from the P&T Department at Aba with a message to a stamp collector saying that three postcards date-stamped by Mobile PO No 1 would be sent by ordinary post.



Requisition 4245/3 was an order for 5 million from McCorquodales with no duty (ie no indicium) specifically for Nigeria, even though there is no reference to Nigeria on these airletters. The order presumably followed the death of the King, coinciding with the stock of the KGVI aerogrammes for Nigeria running out. The design of the six-line etiquette is the same as concurrent British and Commonwealth air letters which did have indicia. Harris identified two versions, with and without a dotted line around "Stamp to be affixed here". It is impossible to tell which version has been used when stamps are affixed in that place. The used example shown here is a first day cover for the Coronation stamps on 2 June 1953.

These are scarce mint and used internally; they are most often found used externally with a 6d adhesive. A mint example is shown here

Like the blue formula airletter this was also requisitioned as a stop-gap pending the arrival of QE2 internal air letters when the stock of the KGVI 1d airletters were exhausted. It is also relevant that the price increased to 1½d on 8 April 1952 but it was not worth printing a KGVI stock with the new rate indicia. One million were ordered. The layout of the etiquette is the same as the stamped version (WANG.A.02.01).

The earliest known used date is 21 June 1952. Used examples at 6d to Germany on 1 July 1952 (a very early date) and registered at 9d to Holland on 24 MR 53 are shown here. Both are commercial correspondence from Nigerian traders. The registered one has transit postmark of Lagos on 26 March and a backstamp of Groningen on 30 March.







Here is a very late use of this formula airletter during the period after the internal aerogramme rate increased to 2d on 1 October 1957.

It is from Ikeja Airport Branch Office to Bishop Patterson at Onitsha on 22 October 1959, correctly franked 2d.

For the first time these aerogrammes were printed on IMPERIAL AIR MAIL watermarked paper. In the watermark there is a code letter above the words AIR MAIL and this first printing has code "reversed F". This first printing is also identifiable by blue outline around the "perforations".

As with the equivalent adhesive the "6d stamp" is in grey-black and orange-brown but this requisition seems to have been fulfilled in batches because the mask is recorded as initially orange-brown, then yellow-brown during November 1953 to October 1954 and finally light orange-brown in November & December 1954.









As long as air letter and enclosure did not exceed one ounce this did not mean the letter would be taxed because the letter rate was also 1%d. It would also not delay the post because by this date WAAC was flying the internal mails between the major cities!







It was sent from Kaduna North to Kingsway Stores, Lagos, correctly uprated to 2d, when Dudley Prestedge was the manager, so he will have captured such an interesting usage.





The identifying features of both WANG.A.06 types are removal of the blue edge to the perforations and addition of the text "If anything is enclosed this letter will be sent by ordinary mail" and space for the sender's name and address on the reverse.

An unused example of watermark G is shown. I am not aware of any unused example of watermark F in existence.


This is the 1954 version of the internal aerogramme, duly uprated for postage to the USA from Yaba on 28th November 1958 with a 3d postage stamp and a 1½d cut-out from another pre-printed aerogramme. It is interesting, being from philatelist Nils Rasmusson, whose Lagos Timber Company notepaper shows a range of other activities, and being sent to Richard Singley, a well-known airmail collector, whose address appears on many unwritten aerogrammes. The new Nigerian aerogramme is referred to (next sheet); however, it's likely the "large head" was not philatelic, but part of Rasmusson's other business!

H&G9, Harris WANG.A.010.01. Requisition 1289/1, 12 million ordered Date of issue 1 November 1958, despite having been approved in November 1957.

The internal aerogramme postage increased to 2d from 1 October 1957, but earliest known used date; 26 November 1958.

Presumably old stocks of WANG.A.09.01 were to be used up with added ½d adhesives.

The aerogramme on the right was sent after the rate had increased again, to 3d on 1st February 1961. It was posted on 25th September 1961 from Yala Market Postal Agency in Ogoja to Enugu, about 120 miles to the West. It would not have flown.

The 2d postage due stamp covers double the deficiency, and the use of a registered handstamp to cancel it is quite typical. It apparently took 3 days to reach Enugu.

There are many detail differences between the previous version of the Benin Mask aerogramme and this final one. The clearest is in the warning text, which uses a different font, most visible in the letter U.




This aerogramme was produced for use to members of the Organisation of African Unity (OAU) for which the 6d rate continued after the overseas rate was otherwise increased to 9d in 1966. It seems this concession did not continue after the overseas rate increased again on 1 July 1971 to 1/-. It is rare to find it used as intended and most stocks were uprated for worldwide use.

This stamp has a 0.8mm space between the right foot of the A of NIGERIA and the corner of the design and the whole design has finer detail, especially seen in the pattern on the broad head of the spear.

# NIGERIA AEROGRAMMES

Decimalisation took place in Nigeria on 1st January 1973 (the last Commonwealth country to take this step). In the new currency:
100 kobo (k) = 1 naira (₦), with ₦2 equivalent to £1.

Decimal stamps are said not to have been issued until **2nd April 1973** (SG catalogue). That makes these two aerogrammes interesting - each a **First Day Cover**. The copy on the right (the late 1968 version) was written on 31st March 1973 and cancelled in Kaduna at 7am on **Sunday 1st April 1973**. The full overseas rate of 10k in stamps was added - presumably the writer thought that the 9d stamp was no longer valid. **The stamps must have been on sale prior to the date they were officially issued.** The writer does not mention the stamps or anything relevant, so this is not a philatelic creation.

The copy below (1971 version) is uprated with a 2k stamp (equivalent to 3d) so that the total postage is the correct rate 10k (1/-) for an overseas aerogramme. It was posted in Katsina on 2nd April 1973, the recorded first day of issue. SG notes that genuine first day covers of the definitive set have a backdated postmark of 1st April.






1973. Various pre-decimal aerogrammes uprated using decimal adhesives.




## **NIGERIA AEROGRAMMES**

From 1973 through to the penultimate issue of overseas aerogrammes a new layout was adopted, which does not fit easily into display sheets. The layout is shown here at ¾ scale. They were printed by the Nigeria Security Printing & Minting Co. Ltd.

Internal aerogrammes continued with the layout first used for the 1968 issue, 4d Leopards.

The overseas rate remained at 10k until 1979. A version of the 10k definitive stamp was used for this aerogramme with no apparent significant differences throughout its life, apart from a deeper blue shade of printing seen in 1977/78.



## NIGERIA AEROGRAMMES



The inland aerogramme rate increased to 5k (the old 6d), from 4d at decimalisation on 1st April 1973. The layout of the first decimal aerogramme was exactly the same as the last plate of the 4d, incorporating the 5k Cattle Ranching stamp of the new definitive series, printed in one operation with the text and border.

This rate prevailed for 6 years and the aerogramme was issued in varying shades of green and tints of paper. On the left is the earliest recorded example, sent overseas on 12th December 1973 from Jos.

Below is a cancelled to order copy (Lagos 2nd April 1974) in a deep green shade with separate cattle hardly visible.

I think a better differentiation is the print colour: deep green or light green as shown here, unused.








On 1 January 1991 the rates increased again, to N1 for an external aerogramme and 50 kobo for an internal one.

I am only able to show the 40 kobo aerogrammes uprated by using adhesives to the additional value of 60 kobo.









## 1991. N1 STONE QUARRY external airletter in blue.

M&W24, Harris WANG.A.27.01. Printed by NSP&M in Nigeria. Numbers printed not found.

This was printed from the same plates as the previous 40 kobo blue aerogramme, with just the stamp design substituted. Earliest known cancellation date is 23 October 1991. The used example shown here is, according to the inside text, dated 4 November 1992 from Benin.



In 1991 (possibly 2 April) the rates increased again, to N20 for an external aerogramme and N1.50 for an internal one. By this time the Nigerian public was making very little use of aerogrammes, so there was substantial excess stock of the old 20 kobo and 50 kobo internal aerogrammes and of the 20 kobo, 40 kobo and 1 Naira external aerogrammes. Although new N1.50 and N20 aerogrammes were eventually printed in 1993, handstamps were used to redenominate the old stocks for at least the two years from 1991 to 1993.

These are very scarce and I am not able to show either value as a complete air letter sheet, mint or used. I can show the N1.50 surcharge on 50 kobo green as a cut-out on an internal letter to Lagos which lacks a clear cds of origin.





This was printed on completely new plates.

Date of issue 1994 according to GSM April 1996 and the earliest known used date is 4 April 1994. The commercially used example dated 28 October 1994 from Murtala Muhammed Airport to Bangladesh has much less green colour in the "stamp" than the cancelled to order example dated 20 April 1995.



1996. The overseas rate for aerogrammes increased again, to N30, but the exact date is not yet known.

As a result of this increase the excess stock of the N20 roan antelopes was uprated in either of two ways.

Some of the stock was sold with an extra N10 adhesive. The unused aerogramme shown here was uprated with a copy of the 1999 N5+5 stamp raising funds for the 1999 World Youth Football Championships for which Nigeria was the host.

The "+N5" element should not have been treated as postage but the postal clerk who sold this appears not to have known.



1996. The overseas rate for aerogrammes increased again, to N30, but the exact date is not yet known.

As a result of this increase the excess stock of the N20 roan antelopes was uprated in either of two ways.

Some of the stock was sold with an extra N10 adhesive. Two used copies to Finland and to the UK were uprated with N10 adhesives but, curiously, despite the commercial addresses shown here, neither contains any message.



1996. The overseas rate for aerogrammes increased again, to N30, but the exact date is not yet known.

As a result of this increase the excess stock of the N20 roan antelopes was uprated in either of two ways.

Some of the stock was sold with an extra N10 adhesive and in the case of the registered aerogramme shown here there is a further N50 adhesive to pay the registration fee to Hong Kong.

The Hong Kong receiving cds confirms that it was sent from Ibadan on 21 June 1996.



1996. The overseas rate for aerogrammes increased again, to N30, but the exact date is not yet known.

As a result of this increase the excess stock of the N20 roan antelopes was uprated in either of two ways.

The other way to uprate these N20 aerogrammes to N30 was to apply a handstamp shown here on an indistinctly cancelled used copy sent to Germany on 20 February 1997.



1996. The overseas rate for aerogrammes increased again, to N30, but the exact date is not yet known. It is also known from material such as the aerogramme front shown here, that excess stock of old N1 aerogrammes was also handstamped. In this case the N20:00 handstamp must have been added in about 1993 when the rate rose to N20, but then the aerogramme was sold to a user after the rate further increased to N30 in 1996, for which a N10 adhesive was added.

Although this is only a front, the reverse luckily includes the sending date – 28 September 98 – from Yola.



Finally, probably in 1996 when the overseas rate increased to N30, the green internal aerogramme shown here gives evidence of an increase in the internal aerogramme rate from N1.50 to N5.00. It has been handstamped twice, from 20 kobo to N1.50, then again to N5.00. It was eventually correctly used internally from Oron to the BBC World Service at Lagos on 2 April 1998.

It is unique!
