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in the laboratory or on a larger scale elsewhere, does not encourage belief that the employment of the bacillus he describes is likely to be of material service in setting up among rats a disease that will lead to their extermination. To effect this object it is necessary that the bacillus employed should retain a fatal degree of virulence throughout a considerable series of transferences from rat to rat. M. Danysz recognises that his bacillus does not fulfil this condition; and attempts to meet the difficulty by the renewal, at intervals of 10 days, of the stock of infective matter laid out for rats to feed upon. Unfortunately, the migratory habits of rats are believed to lead to their leaving a neighbourhood in which serious mortality has appeared among their comrades. In such cases the epidemic would rapidly exhaust itself owing to the tendency of the bacillus to lose its virulence at an early stage in its transference from the body of rat to rat. The application of the method, therefore, to a locality in which Piague had broken out, might only lead to the migration to localities as yet uninfected, of rats which might carry with them to these localities the infection of Plague itself.

In any more general endeavour, however, to exterminate rats in localities free from Plague, the risk referred to would not exist; and it is possible that, with careful attention to the precautions insisted on by M. Danysz, considerable destruction of rats might be brought about if neighbouring localities were to

combine in simultaneous conduction of the experiment. It is, however, doubtful whether complete extermination of rats would be attained. In M. Danysz's sewer experiment, eight rats out of 200 remained alive on the 18th day after introduction of the first batch of infective material into the sewer; and this notwithstanding introduction of fresh material on the 8th day. Nor does it seem safe to assume that 192 rats perished in the course of the experiment, inasmuch as the eight that remained alive effected their escape. owing to negligence of the custodian. If therefore there was other negligence (unknown to M. Danysz) more rats may have escaped: for only 80 dead bodies of rats were discovered in the sewer, owing perhaps in part, but it may be not entirely, to survivors having eaten those that had succumbed. Be this as it may it would seem that some rats display a considerable degree of immunity to the bacillus; and it is to meet this difficulty that M. Danysz advises resort to his method especially in the breeding seasons, since young rats are more susceptible. Nevertheless the actual difficulties experienced by M. Danysz, as well as by M. Abel (as quoted), indicate that, although the method may not be without value, it cannot be as yet regarded as likely to ensure extermination of rats.

Hence anyone who sleeps in or even near native quarters runs the risk of being bitten by an infected anopheles and of catching malaria.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the Post Office:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED as follows:-

I .- This Proclamation may be cited as "The Post Office Proclamation, 1902."

II.-In this Proclamation unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say :-

- "Postmaster-General" means the Postmaster in charge of the head Post-office of the Protectorate.
- "Postal matter" means any article required to be sent by post or placed in a receptacle for the collection of articles to be sent by post or delivered to an officer or servant of the Postal Department for transmission by post.
- "Postage" means the duty charged for the transmission of postal
- "Mail" includes every conveyance by which postal matter is carried, and also a person or animal employed or used in conveying or delivering postal matter.

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"Postal matter bag" includes any bag or box or parcel, or other No. 8 (1902). envelope or covering in which postal matter is conveyed, whether it does or does not contain postal matter.

- "Packet-boat" means a Post Office packet employed by or under the Post Office or Admiralty of the United Kingdom, as well as any vessel employed in conveying postal matter by the Postal Department of the Protectorate.
- "Postal officer" includes the Postmaster-General and every Postmaster, agent, officer, clerk, sorter, messenger, letter-carrier, post-boy, rider, or any other person employed in any business of the Post Office, whether employed by the High Commissioner or any Postmaster or any person under a Postmaster or on behalf of the Post Office.
- "Postal servant" includes any person temporarily employed in any business of the Post Office.
- "Post Office" means any house, building, room, or place where post-letters are received, or delivered or deposited, or in which they are sorted, made up, or despatched.
- "Letter" includes "packet" and the expression "packet" includes "letter."
- "Valuable security" includes any order or other security whatsoever entitling, or evidencing the title, of any person or body corporate to any share or interest in any public stock or fund, whether of the United Kingdom, or of any Foreign State, or of any British possession or Protectorate, or in any fund or any body corporate, Company, or Society, whether within the United Kingdom or in any Foreign State or British possession, or to any deposit in any bank, and shall also include any debenture. deed, bond, bill, note, warrant, order, or other security whatsoever, for money, or for payment of money, whether of the United Kingdom, or of any Foreign State, or any British possession or Protectorate, and any document of title to lands or goods.
- "Post-office letter-box" includes any pillar-box, wall-box, or other box or receptacle provided by the permission or under the authority of the Postmaster-General for the purpose of receiving postal matter for transmission by or under the authority of the Postmaster-General.
- "Infected place" means and includes any port or place where any dangerous disease of an infectious or contagious character in fact prevails or which is declared to be an infected place under the provisions of any Proclamation.

I.-ESTABLISHMENT AND REGULATION OF THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT.

III.—The High Commissioner may appoint a Postmaster-General, and such number of Postmasters and other postal officers and servants as may be necessary, and authorise the payment to them of such salaries and allowances as he may determine; and every postal officer and servant shall be removeable from office, and from one district to another, or from one place to any other place within the same district, at the discretion of the High Commissioner.

IV.—The Postmaster-General, and the other postal officers and servants, shall form the Postal Department of the Protectorate.

V .- Every postal officer and servant shall, on appointment, appear before a Commissioner and make a declaration in the form in the Schedule hereto, or in any other form prescribed by the High Commissioner.

VI.—The High Commissioner, or the Postmaster-General, with the sanction of the High Commissioner, from time to time may enter into such contracts as may be necessary for the conveyance of postal matter, or otherwise for carrying into effect the provisions of this Proclamation, and may vary or revoke such contracts.

VII.—The High Commissioner may, from time to time by order, adopt the terms, stipulations, conditions, or Regulations agreed upon by the Universal Postal Union for or respecting, or in relation to, the transmission of postal matter, and declare that the same, or any part or modification thereof, shall be in force within the Protectorate, and every such order shall have the same force and effect as if the provisions therein contained were inserted in this Proclamation.

VIII.—The High Commissioner may establish Post Offices in any place within the limits to which this Proclamation extends where he considers the public convenience requires them.

IX.—The High Commissioner may determine at what Post Offices Post Office Orders for the payment of money may be issued and paid, subject to such conditions as to amount, and the duties payable thereon, and otherwise, as he may determine.

X.—The Postal Department of the Protectorate shall have the exclusive privilege of conveying from one place to another, between which postal communications shall be established under this Proclamation, all letters, except in the following cases, and shall also have the exclusive privilege of performing all the incidental services of receiving, collecting, conveying, sending, despatching, and delivering all letters from any one place to another between which such postal communications shall be established, except in the following cases, that is to say:-

Special probibitions.

XI.—The following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a letter, or to receive or collect or deliver a letter, although they shall not receive hire or reward for the same, that is to say :-

- (a) Common known carriers, their servants or agents, except a letter concerning goods in their carts or waggons or on their pack-horses.
- (b) Postal officers.
- (c) Owners, masters, or 'commanders of ships, vessels, steam boats, or boats called or being passenger or packet-boats. sailing or passing coastwise or otherwise between ports or places within the Protectorate, except in respect of letters of merchants, owners of ships, or goods on board.
- (d) Passengers or other persons on board any such ships, vessels. steam-boats, or passage or packet-boats.
- (c) The owners of, or sailors, watermen, or others on board a ship. vessel, steam-boat, or other boat, canoe, or barge, passing or repassing on a river, lagoon, or navigable canal within the Protectorate.

XII.-Any Postmaster may detain any postal matter which shall be posted contrary to this Proclamation, and to open such postal matter, and either to return the same to the sender thereof, or to forward the same to the place of its destination, charged in either case with such

XIII.—The High Commissioner may determine the rates of postage to be charged for the transmission of the different descriptions of postal matter by the Postal Department.

XIV .- The High Commissioner may cause to be provided stamps, stamped envelopes, stamped wrappers, letter-sheet envelopes, and envelopes for registered postal matter and postal cards of all kinds, and the Postal Department shall have the exclusive privilege of issuing the same.

XV.—The High Commissioner may appoint such persons as he shall see fit to retail the stamps denoting the postage or postal matter, and stamped envelopes, stamped wrappers, letter-sheet envelopes, and envelopes for registered postal matter and postal cards of all kinds, under rules to be made by him.

XVI.—The High Commissioner may defray, out of the general revenue of the Protectorate, all proper expenses necessarily incurred in carrying out the provisions of this Proclamation.

XVII.—The moneys arising from the several duties imposed by this Proclamation shall form part of the general revenue of the Protectorate: provided always that any moneys to arise in respect of duties payable to His Majesty for the use of the Imperial Government shall be paid and applied in such manner as His Majesty may be pleased to direct.

XVIII.-No postage shall be paid for the transmission by the Postal Department of any postal matter sent or received by the High Commissioner, or of any postal matter sent or received by any Public Department in connection with the business of such Department: Provided that the High Commissioner may by order published in the "Gazette" direct that postal matter sent by a Public Department shall be franked by the Head of the Department or some officer therein mentioned, and all postal matters not so franked shall be liable to postage.

XIX.—All postage imposed under this Proclamation shall be paid by means of stamps, which shall be affixed before posting to all postal matter liable to such postage to the amount of the rates of postage payable thereon, and if any such postal matter shall be underpaid with stamps, or shall not have any stamps thereon, the same shall be liable to double the unpaid postage, as the case may be, and such double postage shall be paid by the person to whom such postal matter may be addressed on the delivery of the same to him, or to any other person on his behalf, unless he or such person shall refuse to receive the same, in which case such double postage may be recovered from the person sending such postal matter.

XXVII.—Every master of a vessel, not being a packet-boat, arriving in the Protectorate, shall cause all letters on board his vessel for any person at any port or place where the vessel shall report to be collected and enclosed in some bag or other envelope, and to be sealed with his seal, and to be addressed to the Postmaster of that port or place, and shall deliver the same to the Boarding Officer at that port or place, and shall sign a declaration in the presence of such officer, who shall sign the same, and such officer shall hereupon forward all such letters to the Post Office; and no officer of Customs shall permit any such vessel to report till such declaration shall be made and signed as aforesaid. The declaration above referred to shall be in the form or to the effect following, that is to say :-

"I, A.B., Commander of the (state the name of the ship or vessel), arrived from (state the place), do hereby solemnly and sincerely declare that I have, to the best of my knowledge and belief, delivered, or caused to be delivered, to the Boarding Officer of the port of (state the port) every letter, letter bag, package or parcel of letters on board the (state the name of the ship or vessel), for any person at the said port."

Customs officers may seize letters on board ship.

XXVIII.—An officer of Customs at any port in the Protectorate may search any vessel for letters which may be on board contrary to this Proclamation, and may seize all such letters and forward them to the nearest Post Office; and it shall be lawful for the High Commissioner to award to the officer who shall so seize and forward them any portion, not exceeding a moiety, of the penalties which may be recovered for any such offence.

XXIX.—The following persons shall be entitled to have delivered free at the Post Office their letters brought by any such vessel, that is to say, the owners, charterers, or consignees of any such vessel, and the owners, consignees, or shippers of goods on board any such vessel; but the letters brought by any one such vessel to any one such person, and delivered free, shall not exceed collectively 6 oz. in weight, and the owner, charterer, or consignee shall be described as such on the address and superscription; and in the case of owners, shippers, or consignees of goods, it shall also appear by the ship's manifests that they have goods on board the vessel.

XXX.—Every person who shall convey otherwise than by the Postal Department any letter required to be conveyed by post by this Proclamation shall for every letter forfeit £5, and every person who shall be in the practice of so conveying letters required to be conveyed by post shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued forfeit £100; and every person who shall perform otherwise than by post any services incidental to conveying letters from place to place, whether by receiving, or by taking up, or by collecting, or by ordering, or by despatching, or by carrying, or by recarrying, or by delivering a letter requiring to be conveyed by post, shall forfeit for every letter £5; and every person who shall be in the practice of so performing any such incidental services shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit £100; and every person who shall send or cause to be sent a letter requiring to be conveyed by post, otherwise than by post, shall forfeit for every letter £5; and every person who shall be in the practice of committing any of the acts last mentioned shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit £100; and every person who shall make a collection of excepted letters for the purpose of conveying or sending them otherwise than by the post shall forfeit for every letter £5; and every person who shall be in the practice of making a collection of excepted letters for that purpose shall forfeit, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, £100; and the above penalties shall be incurred whether the letter shall be sent singly or with anything else, or such incidental service shall be performed in respect of a letter sent or to be sent either singly or together with some other letter or thing; and in any proceeding for the recovery of any such penalty the onus shall lie upon the party proceeded against to prove that the act in respect of which the penalty is alleged to have been incurred was done in conformity with this Proclamation.

XXXI.—Every person being the master of a vessel, or one of the officers, or one of the crew, or a passenger thereof, who shall knowingly have in his possession any letter required to be sent to the Post Office after the master shall have delivered his bag of ship's letters to the Boarding Officer or other officer shall forfeit for every letter £5; and whether the letter be in the baggage or on the person of the offender, or otherwise in his custody, it shall be held to be in his possession, and every such person who shall detain any such letter after demand made either by the Boarding Officer or by any officer of Customs shall forfeit for every letter £10.

XXXIII.—If during the existence of an order made by the High Commissioner under the provisions of Section XXIX. of this Proclamation any officer authorised to frank postal matter shall unlawfully superscribe any postal matter which does not relate to the business of his office or Department, with intent to defraud the Postal Department of the postage payable thereon, such officer shall for the first offence forfeit £100, and for the second offence shall forfeit the like sum, and be liable to dismissal.

XXXIV.—Any postal officer or servant who shall wilfully and unlawfully remove from any postal matter any postage stamp affixed thereto in payment of the postage shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10. Any person who shall use, or attempt to use, in payment of the postage on any matter conveyed by mail or otherwise, any postage stamp or stamped envelope or wrapper, or any stamp cut out from any such envelope or wrapper which has been before used for a like purpose, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

XXXV .- If any postal officer or servant shall wilfully and knowingly use, or cause to be used, in prepayment of postage, any postage stamp, postal card, or stamped envelope or wrapper issued by authority of the High Commissioner which has already been once used for a like purpose, or shall remove, or attempt to remove, the cancelling or defacing marks from any such postage stamp or stamped envelope or wrapper or postal card, with intent to use the same or to cause the same to be used a second time, or to sell, or offer to sell the same, or shall remove from any postal matter deposited in, or received at, a Post Office the stamps attached to the same in payment of postage, with intent to use the same a second time for a like purpose, or to sell, or offer to sell, the same, every such offender shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and liable to imprisonment for any period not exceeding Three Months.

Other persons using stamps, &c., a second time—punishment.

XXXVI.—If any person other than a postal officer or servant shall commit any of the offences described in the last preceding section, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and liable to a fine not exceeding £10, or imprisonment for any period not exceeding Three Months.

XXXVII .- Any person who forges or counterfeits any postage stamp, or any stamp printed upon any stamped envelope or wrapper or postal card, or any die, plate, or engraving thereof, or who makes, or prints, or knowingly uses or sells, or has in his possession with intent to use or sell, any such forged or counterfeited postage stamp or stamped envelope or wrapper, postal card, die, or plate, or engraving, or who makes, or knowingly uses or sells, or has in his possession with intent to use or sell the same, any paper resembling, or apparently intended to resemble, any stamped envelope or wrapper or post-card, or who, without due authority, and with intent to defraud, makes or prints, or authorises or procures to be made or printed, any postage stamp, stamped envelope, or wrapper or postal card of the kind authorised by the High Commissioner, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and liable to penal servitude for any term not exceeding seven years.

XXXVIII .- Any person who-

- (a) Makes, knowingly utters, deals in, or sells any fictitious stamp, or knowingly uses for any postal purpose any fictitious stamp; or
- (b) Has in his possession, unless he shows a lawful excuse, any fictitious stamp; or
- (c) Makes, or unless he shows a lawful excuse, has in his possession any die, plate, instrument, or materials for making any fictitious stamp; shall be

liable to a fine not exceeding £20. Any stamp, die, plate, instrument, or materials found in possession of any person in contravention of this section may be seized and shall be forfeited.

For the purpose of this section "fictitious stamp" means any facsimile or imitation or representation, whether on paper or otherwise, of any stamp for denoting any rate of postage of the United Kingdom or of any British Possession or of any foreign country.

XXXIX.—Any person who sends, or attempts to send, any postal matter which either-

- (a) Incloses any explosive substance, any dangerous substance, any filth, any noxious or deleterious substance, any sharp instrument not properly protected, any living creature which is either noxious or likely to injure other postal matter in course of conveyance, or a postal officer, or any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure either other postal matter in course of conveyance, or an officer of the Department; or
- (b) Incloses any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph. lithograph, engraving, book, or card, or any indecent or obscene article, whether similar to the above or not; or
- (c) Has on such postal matter, or on the cover thereof, any words, marks, or the sign of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character-

Penalties for forgery or acts contributory thereto.

> Penalties for posting improper postal

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shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £10, and on conviction on indictment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding Twelve Months.

The detention in the Post Office of any postal matter, on the ground of its being in contravention of this section, shall not exempt the sender thereof from any proceedings which might have been taken if the same had been delivered in due course of post.

Penalties for injury to Post Office property.

XL.-Every person who wilfully or maliciously defiles, injures, tears down, removes, or destroys any Post Office letter-box, or who places or attempts to place in or against any Post Office letter-box, any fire, any match, any light, any explosive substance, any dangerous substance, any filth, any noxious or deleterious substance, or any fluid, or who commits a nuisance in or against the Post Office letter-box, or who does, or attempts to do, anything likely to injure the box, its appurtenances or contents, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £10, and on conviction on indictment to imprisonment for any period not exceeding One Year.

Penalty for deface-ment of Post Office

XLI .- Any person who, without due authority, affixes, or attempts to fix, any placard, advertisement, notice, list, document, board, or thing on, or paint or tar any Post Office or Post Office letter-box, or in any way disfigures any such office or box, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Forty Shillings.

Prohibition of imitation of Post Offices.

XLII .- A person shall not, without authority from the Postmaster-General, place or maintain in or on any house, wall, door, window, box, post, pillar, or other place belonging to him, or under his control, any of the words, letters, or marks following, that is to say:

- (a) The words "Post-Office," or
- (b) The words "Letter-box," accompanied with the words, letters, or marks which signify or imply, or may reasonably lead the Public to believe, that it is a Post Office letter-box; or
- (c) Any words, letters, or marks which signify or imply, or may reasonably lead the Public to believe that any house or place is a Post Office, or that any box is a Post Office box.

And a person when required by a notice given by the Postmaster-General to remove or efface any such words, letters or marks as aforesaid, or to remove or effectually close up any letter-box belonging to him, or under his control, which has been a Post Office letter-box, shall comply with such request.

Any person who acts in contravention of this section shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding Forty Shillings, and to a further fine not exceeding Five Shillings for each day during which the offence is continued after conviction thereof.

XLIII.—Every person employed to convey or deliver a postal-matter bag, or any postal-matter, who shall whilst so employed, or whilst the same shall be in his custody, care, or possession, leave a postal-matter bag or any postal-matter, or suffer any unauthorised person to ride in or upon any carriage used for the conveyance of the postal-matter bag or postal-matter, and not licensed to carry passengers, or upon a horse used for the conveyance on horseback of a postal-matter bag, or any postalmatter, or who shall be guilty of an act of drunkenness or of carelessness, negligence, or other misconduct, whereby the safety of a postal-matter bag, or any postal-matter, shall be in danger, or who shall collect, or receive, or convey, or deliver a letter otherwise than in the ordinary course of the post, or who shall give any false information of an assault or attempt at robbery upon him, or who shall leiter on the road or passage, or wilfully misspend his time so as to retard or delay the progress or arrival of a postal-matter bag, or any postal-matter, or who shall not use due and proper care and diligence safely to convey a postal-matter bag, or any postal-matter, at the rate of speed appointed by and according to the Rules of the Postal Department for the time being, shall be guilty of an offence, and liable to a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds, or to imprisonment for any term not exceeding Three Months.

XLIV .- Every postal officer or servant who shall, contrary to his duty, open or procure, or suffer to be opened, any postal-matter, or shall wilfully detain or delay, or procure or suffer to be detained or delayed, any postal-matter shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or imprisonment for any period not exceeding Twelve Months, or to both.

Provided always that nothing herein contained shall extend to the opening, or detaining, or delaying of any postal-matter returned for want of a true direction, or of any postal-matter returned by reason that the person to whom the same shall be directed is dead or cannot be found, or shall have refused the same, or shall have refused or neglected to pay the postage thereof, nor to the opening, or detaining, or delaying of any postal-matter in obedience to an express warrant in writing under the hand of the High Commissioner.

XLV.—Every postal officer or servant who shall steal, or shall, for any purpose whatever, embezzle, secrete, or destroy any postal-matter, shall be guilty of felony, and liable to penal servitude for any term not exceeding Seven Years; and if any such postal-matter so stolen, embezzled, secreted, or destroyed shall contain therein any chattel or money whatsoever, or any valuable security, every such offender shall be liable to penal servitude for life.

XLVI.—Every person who shall steal from or out of any postal-matter any chattel or money, or valuable security, shall be guilty of felony, and liable to penal servitude for life.

XLVII.-Every person who shall steal a postal-matter bag or any postal-matter from a postal-matter bag, or shall steal any postal-matter Persons engaged or nes or mails of letters, &c., guilty negligence, or mis

on summary

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Opening or delaying

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from a Post Office, or from any Officer of the Postal Department, or from a mail, or shall stop a mail with intent to rob or search the same, shall be guilty of felony, and be liable to penal servitude for life.

Punishment for stealing postal matter sent by packet boat.

XLVIII.—Every person who shall steal or unlawfully take away a postal-matter bag sent by a packet-boat, or who shall steal or unlawfully take a letter out of any such bag, or shall unlawfully open any such bag, shall be guilty of felony, and be liable to penal servitude for life.

Receivers of property sent by post stolen or embezzled, guilty of

XLIX.—Every person who shall receive any postal matter or postalmatter bag, or any chattel or money, or valuable security, the stealing or taking, or embezzling, or secreting whereof shall amount to a felony under this Proclamation, knowing the same to have been feloniously stolen, taken, embezzled, or secreted, and to have been sent, or to have been intended to be sent, by the post, shall be guilty of felony, and may be indicted and convicted either as an accessory after the fact or for a substantive felony, and, in the latter case, whether the principal felon shall or shall not have been previously convicted, or shall or shall not be amenable to justice; and every such receiver, howsoever convicted, shall be liable to penal servitude for life.

Fraudulently retaining, after delivery thereof by mistake, any letter, &c.-misdemennour,

L.—Every person who shall fraudulently retain, or shall wilfully secrete, or keep, or detain, or, being required to deliver up by a postal officer, shall neglect or refuse to deliver up any postal-matter which ought to have been delivered to any other person, or a postal-matter bag, or any postal-matter which shall have been sent, whether the same shall have been found by the person secreting, keeping, or detaining, or neglecting or refusing to deliver up the same, or by any other person, shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and liable to fine or imprisonment, or both.

Forging or altering drafts, warrants, or orders of the Postal Department, felony.

LI.—Every person who shall forge, or alter, or shall offer, utter, dispose of, or put off, knowing the same to be forged or altered, any draft, warrant, or order of the Postmaster-General or of any postal officer for money or for payment of money, with intent to defraud any person whomsoever, shall be guilty of felony, and liable to penal servitude for life.

Forging or altering

LII .- Every person who shall forge or counterfeit the handwriting of another person in the superscription of any postal-matter, or who shall alter or change upon any postal-matter the superscription thereof, or who shall write, or send by the post, or cause to be written, or sent by post, any postal-matter the superscription whereof, in whole or in part, shall be forged, or counterfeited, or altered, with intent, in either of those cases, to avoid the payment of the postage, shall be guilty of felony, and liable to penal servitude for life.

Principal in the second degree and accessories: how to be punished.

LIII.—In case of every felony punishable under this Proclamation, every principal in the second degree, and every accessory before the fact, shall be punishable in the same manner as the principal in the first degree is punishable; and every accessory after the fact to any felony punishable under this Proclamation (except only a receiver of any property or thing

stolen, taken, embezzled, or secreted) shall be liable to imprisonment. And every person who shall aid, abet, counsel, or procure the commission of any misdemeanour punishable under this Proclamation, shall be liable to be indicted and punished as a principal offender.

LIV .- Every person who shall solicit or endeavour to procure any other person to commit a felony or misdemeanour punishable by this Proclamation shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and liable to imprisonment.

LV .- (1) Where under any section of this Proclamation a person is liable to penal servitude, the sentence may, at the discretion of the Court, be either a sentence of penal servitude for any term not less than Three Years, and not exceeding any greater period authorised by the section, or a sentence of imprisonment for any period not exceeding Two Years.

- (2) Where under any section of this Proclamation a person is liable to imprisonment, then, unless the section otherwise provides, the sentence may, at the discretion of the Court, be for any period not exceeding Two Years.
- (3) Any sentence of imprisonment under this Proclamation may be with or without hard labour, as the Court directs.
- (4) The Court may in its discretion reduce the amount of any pecuniary penalty recovered under this Proclamation.

IX.-LIABILITY OF POST OFFICE.

LVI.—The Post Office shall not be liable for any loss or inconvenience which may arise from damage, delay, non-delivery, mis-sending, or misdelivery of any postal-matter, but compensation for actual loss or damage may be paid under the provisions of any rules made under this Proclamation in the case of parcels and any registered postal-matter.

Liability of Post

X .- LEGAL PROCEDURE.

LVII.—In any case where an offence shall be committed in respect or a postal-matter bag or any postal-matter, or a chattel or money or valuable security sent by the post, it shall be lawful to lay the property of the postal-matter bag, or of the postal-matter, or chattel, or money, or the valuable securities sent by the post, in the Postmaster-General, and it shall not be necessary in the information to allege or to prove upon the trial or otherwise that the postal-matter bag, or any such postal-matter or valuable security, was of any value; and in any information to be preferred against any postal officer or servant for any offence committed against this Proclamation, it shall be lawful to state that such offender was employed by or under the Postal Department at the time of the committing of such offence, without stating further the nature of his employment.

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How postage to be

LVIII.-All postage imposed by or by authority of this Proclamation may be sued for and recovered with full costs of suit in a summary manner before any Commissioner holding a judicial warrant on the complaint of any Postmaster or other postal officer.

Saving of existing legal rights.

LIX.—This Proclamation shall not exempt any person from any proceeding, by information or otherwise, for an offence which is punishable at common law or under any law other than this Proclamation, so that no person be tried or punished twice for the same offence.

When proceedings are taken against a person in respect of an offence under this Proclamation, which is also an offence at common law, or under some law other than this Proclamation, the Court may direct that instead of such proceedings being continued, proceedings shall be taken for punishing such person at common law or under such other law or Proclamation, other than this Proclamation.

XI.-PROTECTION OF OFFICERS.

Penalty for obstruct-

LX.-Any person who wilfully obstructs or incites any one to obstruct a postal officer in the execution of his duty, or who, whilst in any Post Office or within any premises belonging to any Post Office or used therewith, obstructs the course of business of the Post Office, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Forty Shillings.

Any postal officer may require any person guilty of an offence under this section to leave the Post Office or such premises, and if such person refuses or fails to comply with such request such person shall be liable to a further fine not exceeding Five Pounds, and may be removed by any officer of the Postal Department; and all persons empowered to act as constables are required on demand to remove, or assist in removing, every such person.

Repeal of Post Office Ordinance.

LXI .- "The Post Office Ordinance, 1894," shall be and is hereby repealed, provided that all rules and regulations made under the said Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect until superseded by rules made under this Proclamation.

Date of operation.

LXII.—This Proclamation shall commence and come into operation on the First day of JULY, in the year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and two.

CIRCULAR.

DOWNING STREET, 11th July, 1905.

With reference to my Circular of the 29th April last respecting the authority given to the Indian Government to sanction grants of the Indian Order of Merit in future without previous reference to the Colonial Governments concerned when the cost involved would be borne by Colonial funds, I have the honour to inform you that the Government of India has proposed that the Order of British India should similarly be granted without previous reference to this country, and that I have assented to the proposal so far as it may concern any Colony or Protectorate whose finances are under the control of His Majesty's Govern-

The Order of British India was instituted as an award to Indian Native Officers for long and honourable service. I am informed however by the India Office that it is also conferred for excellent service in the field, and that their proposal refers only to such appointments; and I have to request that it may be noted that, in the event of Indian Native Officers being borrowed for service in the Colony under your Government, the Government of India will have authority to

sanction the award of the Order, as in the case of the Order of Merit, at Colonial expense, without previous reference to this country or to the Colony.

CIRCULAR.

DOWNING STREET, 17th July, 1905.

In continuation of my predecessor's Circular despatches of the 20th of December, 1898, 15th February, 1st May, and 2nd of September, 1899, 30th of October and 29th of November, 1900, and the 28th of April, 1902, respecting the adoption of the Imperial penny postage scheme by certain colonies, I have the honour to inform you that an arrangement has been concluded with the Government of Australia, under which the Commonwealth Postal Administration will admit without surcharge letters posted in the United Kingdom or any British Colony or Possession, postage on which has been prepaid at the rate of 1d. per half ounce. The arrangement applies equally to British New Guinea, Lord Howe Island and Norfolk Island.

This reduction will not, however, at present apply to letters from Australia, postage on which to any part of the Empire will be at the rate of 2d, per half ounce.

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

REGULATIONS IN CONNECTION WITH LANDING OF GOODS AT THE CUSTOM HOUSES FOR DEPOSIT IN THE KING'S WAREHOUSE.

1. The following goods must be landed at the Custom House to be conveyed to the King's Warehouse at ports where the Government have crected ware-

- (i) The goods of importers who are not holders of General Permits, who have not passed entry within the prescribed time;
- (ii) The goods for which entry cannot be passed before the importing ship leaves, and which will otherwise be overcarried, where only a small quantity of goods remain undischarged: Lagos, 24th August, 1906.

- (iii) The goods brought from West African Ports, unless otherwise permitted by the Collector of Customs.
- 2. All such goods must be brought ashore in licensed lighters, which will be subject to such rules as the Collector of Customs may from time to time make.
- 3. Applications for licenses should be made to the Collector of Customs, who will issue the license subject to the approval of the High Commissioner.
- 4. Applicants for licenses are required to submit the Table of Rates to be charged and any Regulations in connection with the landing and handling of the goods by the licensed lighters, and an undertaking will be required that the licensees will be responsible for the duty and the packages while the goods are in their
- 5. The following goods must also be deposited in the King's Warehouse:
- (i) The baggage of passengers which has been left behind or abandoned:
- (ii) Seizures;
- (iii) Derelict goods if there is sufficient accommo-
- 6. Rent will be charged on baggage and derelict goods on the scale applicable to other goods.

REPORT ON STEEL BARREL ROLLERS.

The above Barrels have now been in use since March 24th. Two of the largest of these barrels have each traversed a hundred miles of read, along fifty of which they have each conveyed over ten tons of cement; they have required no repairs and as far as one can judge are still as good as new.

The largest barrels hold 1,600 lbs of cement or 680 lbs, of kernels (136 lbs, equal a bushel of raw kernels). Ten men can pull a barrel loaded with coment and four men a barrel loaded with kernels, Yesterday afternoon five men who had already helped to bring a barrel of cement 31 miles and returned with the empty barrel to Bailma, brought the same barrel back again loaded with kernels the 31 miles in 2 hours 25 minutes, they were neither tired nor heated and said that they would have come much quicker only the knots in the "harness" hurt them, and the ruts and holes in the road "humbugged" the barrel. This morning four of these men took the barrel of kernels back to Bailma in 2 hours and 20 minutes. Before they started I adjusted and padded the harness. On arriving at Bailma they were neither blown nor tired, and I asked each man separately whether he would rather pull the barrel or tote a hundred pounds of kernels on his back? they were all chancrously unanimous in favour of the barrel and seemed amused at my asking such a ridiculous question. These men have been toting cement in the barrel for the past month and have learnt the value of it as a means of easy transport, but they had not tried the harness before, which at the lowest estimate gives a man 50 per cent. more pulling power; up hill they can keep a steady even pace, whereas without the harness they slip and walk backwards to pull as in a tug of war, and they frequently have to stop and rest.

On a properly graded and finished road I estimate that 8 men with harness could easily pull a barrel of cement along at a rate of two miles an hour, and four men a barrel of kernels at a similar rate.

The 31 miles of road used for the above experiment is only levelled in places, three miles being only cleared and grabbed and ant hills levelled off portions are on sidelong ground, and where stumps have been removed the recent rains have made large shallow holes and there are frequent short little grades of 1 inch.

The four men who pulled the barrel of kernels were arranged as follows:-

One man with handle to guide and also to pull when necessary; one man on each side each with a rope to his waist pulling both from his neck and waist and also with a rope over his shoulder; and a fourth man behind to help to push the barrel up extra steep grades and to change about with the man with the handle. The harness should be padded on the back of the neck and where the straps cross at the waist, epaulettes should also be attached to the neck strap. The four men who pulled the barrel were rather below the average both in weight and strength.

COPRA.

There are upwards of sixty varieties of cocoa-nuts known, and care should be taken to select those which bear fruit in the greatest number, and of the best oil-producing quality. They should be planted about 25 to 33 feet apart, and where the climate is at all dry, should be sunk in pits 3 or 4 feet deep, which will serve to retain the moisture. Some 5,000 to 10,000 nuts, according to the size, are requisite for the production of 1 ton of copra. It is calculated in the South Pacific that a cocoa-nut palm in full bearing is worth about 4s. per year. This would give a return of about £14 per acre.



REPORT ON FUNTUMIA RUBBER FROM SOUTHERN NIGERIA BY PROFESSOR WYNDHAM R. DUNSTAN, M.A., F.R.S., DIRECTOR.

These samples of rubber, prepared by Mr. Foster in Southern Nigeria from Funtumia clastica, were forwarded to the Imperial Institute by the Colonial Secretary with letter No. 777/4929/6 of the 30th October, 1906, in which it was requested that their commercial value might be ascertained.

Sample A was stated to have been prepared by the process of sun drying on a tray, whereas sample B. was 'cooked in a bottle.'

The samples were too small for chemical examination.

Sample A consisted of a portion of a flat cake of rubber about three-eights of an inch in thickness. It was almost black, free from vegetable impurity, dry, and well prepared. The rubber exhibited very good physical properties. It was valued at 4s. 6d. MAR. 20, 1907.]

A Sample of this limestone was forwarded to the Imperial Institute by the Governor of Southern Nigeria with a letter No. 13, dated the 20th September, 1906, in which it was requested that the suitability of the material for the preparation of lime for building purposes might be ascertained.

A copy of a report by the Engineer in charge of the Lagos Railway, Horin Extension (Survey), was enclosed which stated that deposits of this limestone occur at various points between miles 112 and 123 upon the proposed line of Railway between Oshogbo and Horin.

DESCRIPTION OF SAMPLE,

The sample consisted of a number of irregular concretions, somewhat porous, but on the whole an intimate mixture of calcium carbonate and clay with a small proportion of sandy material. The sand was mainly quartz grains but some felspar grains were also present.

In order to determine the suitability of this material for making mortar and cement the follow. ing trials were made.

A sample was burnt at a full red heat (about 1,100°C).

The resulting quicklime slaked well and developed much heat.

A test block made from the slaked material set fairly rapidly, after the manner of hydrautic lime, After being left for three days in a moist atmosphere the block was sufficiently hard to be placed in water and after 11 days immersion it was tested and found to break at a pressure of 60 lb. to the square inch. A hydraulic lime of slightly higher tensile strength could probably be obtained by heating the crude material to a somewhat higher temperature than 1,100°C. The block had a smooth white surface and the lime would therefore be quite suitable for use as a cementing material for building stone.

A mortar made from a mixture of one part of the slaked lime with three of quartz sand was treated in the same way as the above but the block obtained in this case was rough and porous and broke under a stress of 7 lb. to the square inch. The best results as mortar will probably be obtained by using the lime alone or with only a small proportion of sand.

The sample was not large enough to enable full tests of its cement making properties to be made, but a small powdered sample heated to 1,500°C gave a cement clinker which appeared to be of normal quality.

It is probable that on burning on a large scale especially if the temperature be high, two products will be obtained (1) hydraulic lime, (2) a clinker having the properties of a cement. The latter would be classed as 'grappier' cement, which would have to be ground to a fine powder for use.

It is necessary as a rule to have at least 10 lbs. of a limestone in order that complete mortar and cement trials may be made.

The sample of limestone sent in the present instance was, as already indicated, two small for full investigation but the results obtained are sufficient to show that the material will be quite suitable for use in Southern Nigeria for making hydraulic time and mortar.

A test block made from the slaked material set fairly rapidly, after the manner of hydraulic lime. After being left for three days in a moist atmosphere the block was sufficiently hard to be placed in water and after 11 days immersion it was tested and found to break at a pressure of 60 lb, to the square inch. A hydraulic lime of slightly higher tensile strength could probably be obtained by heating the crude material to a somewhat higher temperature than 1,100°C. The block had a smooth white surface and the lime would therefore be quite suitable for use

as a cementing material for building stone. A mortar made from a mixture of one part of the slaked lime with three of quartz sand was treated in the same way as the above but the block obtained in this case was rough and porous and broke under a stress of 7 lb. to the square inch. The best results as mortar will probably be obtained by using the lime alone or with only a small proportion of sand.

The sample was not large enough to enable full tests of its cement making properties to be made, but a small powdered sample heated to 1,500°C gave a cement clinker which appeared to be of normal

It is probable that on burning on a large scale especially if the temperature be high, two products will be obtained (1) hydraulic lime, (2) a clinker and a cement. The latter

REPORT ON SURVEY OF ORON CROSSING.

I have to report that on the 12th instant I proceeded to Oron with a view to finding a suitable depth of water for Ocean Steamers to proceed right up to Oron and to load there instead of anchoring off Parrot Islands.

2. I found that the Oron Crossing has deepened somewhat and a maximum depth of water can now be had of 11 feet L.W. ordinary Springs.

It will now be possible for steamers to cross at H.W., with a maximum draft of 16 feet and 18 feet H.W. Springs.

3. I have placed a white beacon on the West side of Parrot Island and a turning buoy (black) opposite this beacon and moored in 10 feet L.W.

4. Vessels entering should round this buoy on their port hand, and steer a course for the boat houses on the main latd beach, and a good leading mark will be found by keeping the small Mission House half way up the hill in a line between the two boat houses but a little to the Southward.

After steering this course until arriving to within 3 ship's length of the boat houses a course should be steered for Oron, ample water being found close to main land shore.

5. The anchorage will be off the German Factory where there is plenty of water for ships to swing to their anchor.

7. I proceeded to Oron on the 19th inst, in the German Steamer "Paul Woermann" to verify some bearings and crossed the shallows with a minimum depth of 15# feet one hour before H. W. This Steamer took in 80 tons cargo from the German Factory and left the next day drawing 14.3 feet and crossed a little after half tide.

Piassava is made from the outside skin or bark of the Mimbo or Timbo palm. After the tree has been exhausted of its yield of Mimbo it is left for some three or four weeks, during which period the outer skin or bark, owing to natural decomposition parts from the vegetable-like stem of the palm, and turns a deep shade of brown. It is allowed to putrify when the tree is cut down and the manufacture of the Piassava proceeded with. Each tree only yields one layer of this fibrous bark, the stem inside being composed of hard vegetable matter. When the bark has reached the proper stage it is put into water and left there for five or six days to further rot. It is taken out when the fibre is loose and falling away, when the next process is commenced and is very simple indeed.

Pieces of bark of a common cane are cut into strips, the ends niched with a matchet, converting it into a rough sort of comb, and the coarse brown fibre is taken a strand at a time and drawn through the clefts, the result being to clean the fibre from all the vegetable matter originally adhering to it leaving it clean and almost ready for commercial purposes. It is then placed out in the sun and most carefully and thoroughly dried. Very white fibre is useless and only the brown shades, from the light to the deep colour are used, the latter being the very best and containing all the strength and suppleness which makes Piassava such a valuable fibre.

When making, the important points to be observed are :-

That the Piassava is properly dried, otherwise it rots in transit, and next that all the very white fibre is discarded, otherwise the market price is

It is prepared for shipment in bundles of about five feet in length each a hundredweight. The bundle is made in a rough skeleton frame being bound together with 2 ply United Kingdom cord, while around the centre is sewn a piece of hessian on which the necessary marks for shipment are



- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Lagos s Assessment Ordinance."
- 2. The Governor in Council may appoint fit and proper persons (hereinafter called Assessors) to the number of not less than three nor more than five who shall have the powers and duties hereinafter defined and may provide for the remuneration of such Assessors for the performance of their duties under this Ordinance.

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52. This supervision has been rendered the more effective by the work of the Native supervisors of Courts of whom there are two in the Province. The one is stationed at Calabar and the other at Opobo, but most of their time is spent in travelling round Courts and checking the clerical and accounting work of the Native Court

A concrete testimony to the value of the services of the Supervisors is that of 245 Clerks. queries issued, involving £290., 166 have been finally settled and £175 recovered, while 79 queries are still remaining for final action involving a sum of £115.

53. The number of cases dealt with in these Courts has largely increased during

It will thus be seen how large a majority of cases must be left to the decision of the Native Chiefs by themselves. They are for the most part, men of no literary education at all and can only be guided by a sense of fairness and their knowledge of native law and Custom. The very small number of appeals points to the fact that on the whole their sense of justice is satisfactory. The percentage of appeals and reversals of judgment is less than one in 500.

Appeals from the Minor Courts go to the Native Council to which they are subordinate, and appeals from the Native Council go to the Supreme Court if leave be given by a Commissioner. This system has worked well hitherto and the increasing demand for establishment of new Native Courts shows the trust and confidence which the Courts enjoy among the native population.

54. Great difficulty is experienced in obtaining reliable Clerks for the Native Courts, and unfortunately many Clerks have been unable to withstand temptations which have come in their way and have received severe sentences for embezzling the funds of the Courts, blackmailing would-be litigants, and other nefarious habits.

PRISONS.

55. At the commencement of the year the Prisons in the Eastern Province contained 1,449 Prisoners (Convicted 1,174 and 275 Unconvicted). 6,818 were admitted during the year and 2,524 remained at end of the year.

The conduct of the Prisoners has on the whole been good and they have been chiefly employed on Road making, Brick making, Sanitary work, Grass cutting, etc.

In the Calabar Prison, a tailoring establishment is carried on and Prisoners are also employed making baskets and mats and doing a certain amount of carpentery. The value of the Prisoners' earnings at this Prison is reckoned at £3,314.

56. The general health of the Prisoners at outstations, with the exception of Bendi and Aro-Chuku where some cases of dysentery occurred, has been good. At Calabar, an out-break of beri-beri and dysentery caused considerable mortality amongst the Prisoners. 64 Beri-Beri patients were transferred to Afikpo for change of air with the result that only two died and the remainder are rapidly improving in health.

CIVIL POLICE.

57. The authorized establishment of Police in the Province was 380 all ranks, but 338 was the actual strength on the 31st December, 1907, recruiting having stopped and vacancies not being filled during the last few months, to meet the proposed reduction of the Force for 1908, when the Police will be relieved of Prison duties in the Outstations, and be enabled to devote more time to instruction and training.

58. The force is armed entirely with '303 Martini Enfield carbines taken over from the Southern Nigeria Regiment.

193 men went through a course of Musketry during the year there being rifle ranges at Calabar, Afikpo, Obubra Hill, Bende, and Ikot-Ekpene, with the following results :-

Marksmen 12, 1st Class 28, 2nd Class 40, 3rd Class 113.

59. The total number of criminal cases taken up by the Police in the Province was 1,720, resulting in 1,369 convictions and 351 dismissals.

1,679 cases were tried summarily and 41 at the Assizes.

Property to the value of £615 was reported as stolen and through the activity of the Police property to the value of £371 was recovered.

POSTAL SERVICE.

60. The Post Offices in the Province are at Calabar, Opobo, Bonny, Degema, Brass and Akassa, with Postal Agencies at Duke Town, Creek Town, Norah Beach Opobo, Opobo Town, Aba, Buguma, Bakana and Nsokpo. Postal Orders and stamps can also be obtained at Eket, Obubra, Bende, Afikpo, Owerri, Ikom, Aro-Chuku and Ikot-Ekpene.

61. There has been a decrease in the quantity of mails received and despatched from the Province during the year which can be attributed to the transfer of the seat of Government to Lagos. Totals for the years 1906 and 1907 are as under:-

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PUBLIC WORKS.

65. I am glad to be able to record that the Provincial Office of this Department has now been re-organized and generally placed on a sound footing. Excesses on Works, so common in previous years, have almost entirely disappeared and in many instances savings on votes have been effected.

66. The chief works executed are enumerated below:-

Drainage and Sanitation of Duke Town-Expenditure £1,980.

The improvement of Duke Town, Calabar, has been continued with evident success and before long this town will be a model of neatness and cleanliness. More Latrines have been erected at a cost of £241 and the reclamation of swamp is nearing completion.

Materials have been ordered for extension of Telephone Service to the Factories which will be erected in 1908-cost £500.

Drains on Government Hill have been remodelled and repaired cost £200.

Quarters for 20 Police have been built cost £200.

£282 has been spent on materials for a Slaughter House which is to be erected over the river in Duke Town in 1908.

Materials have also been ordered for a Wharf for Duke Town which is to cost £400, and will be erected in 1908.

The Spring from which the inhabitants of Duke Town derive their water supply has been contained by a 9" brickwall, providing a reservoir of about 65,000 gallons of water, at a cost of £200.

Brick Store has been built at Eket, cost £185—saving of £15.

Jalousies added to Afikpo bungalow, cost £114-saving £4.

Servant Quarters erected at Afikpo cost £180.

Brick Store built at Obubra for Transport, cost £226-saving £24.

Bungalow commenced at Ikom to cost £1,200-£572 spent and building to be completed next March.

Brick Dispensary at Ikom completed, cost £190-saving £10.

Brick Transport Store at Ediba completed, cost £100.

Tennis courts laid at Bonny and Opobo at cost of £100 each.

Coal Store erected, Bonny, cost £292—saving £8.

Clerical Staff Quarters at Bonny, cost £500, completed,

Reclamation of Swamp at Bonny continued at cost of £200.

Extra Quarters built at Opobo for Clerical Staff completed, cost £480, excess £180.

Quarters for labourers built at Brass cost nearly £120, completed with small saving.

Reclamation of Swamp at Brass continued, cost £180.

Hospital and Dispensary at Brass completed at cost of £44 excess £40. (Revote from 1908).

Brick Store and Office, Ahoada, completed, cost £260.

£200 has been spent on new wells and upkeep of wells at various stations.

Also £200 on Sanitary Drainage.

£176 has been spent on Establishment of New Stations and nearly £2,000 on Quarters for New Stations. Under the latter, brick bungalows at Ahoada and Uyo have been commenced and will be completed in March next.

The approved Expenditure under Public Works Extraordinary amounted to £21,450 and actual Expenditure to £13,237. Out of vote of £4,000 for Cradle slipways for Calabar only £23 was brought to account during the year, and of £2,500 for Light-House at Akassa £267 was Expended *

Transport Store at Esu Itu £250 and Stable for Commissioner of Police at Calabar £50 were not taken in hand.

67. Expenditure under Works and Buildings-Recurrent totalled £5,799, approved expenditure being £6,776, exclusive of materials and Stores issued on repayment which amounted to £1,328 whereas only £200 was provided in Estimates.

The greater part of these Stores were supplied to Native Courts. Expenditure under Roads and Bridges Recurrent equalled that approved under Estimates, viz.: -£1,050. In addition, the Public Works expended £1,000 transferred from Roads Extraordinary in metalling roads at Calabar.

- 68. The output of timber during the year from the Government Saw Mills at Etchetim shows a great improvement on that of previous years. 10,939 cubic feet have been turned out at a cost of 2/5 per cubic feet. Arrangements are being made for a new timber reserve as the reserve at Etehetim is now practically denuded of suitable trees from which timber worth the trouble and expense of production can be obtained.
- 69. Brickmaking has been carried on at Etehetim, Uyo, Degema and Obubra with satisfactory results. The cost per thousand at Etchetim has been reduced to £1 17s. 10d.

70. The Public Work Steam Barge "Etchetim" has been run most successfully from a financial point of view and done excellent work transporting Public Works Department stores up the Cross River, etc. Her earnings for the year shew a profit of £495 over expenses. †

71. The Water Supply at Calabar has given satisfaction.

The Trading Firms have not taken advantage of this supply to the extent they might have done considering that it was laid on to the Factories by the Government at their own request and steps are being taking with a view to its more general use which will allow the abolition of tanks (and mosquitoes).

Rates charged are small and as follow:-

During the year 10,500,000 gallons were used by Government Departments and 569,455 gallons by the Public.

ROADS.

72. Roads at Calabar have been well maintained by the Public Works and greatly improved by metalling with gravel obtained from a deposit in the Gardens.

A new graded road engineered by the Public Works Department has been almost completed by Prison labour circling round the hill under the Hope Waddell Institute from Queen Beach. The average grade is 1 in 20.

At a meeting of the Executive Council held at Government House, Lagos, on Tuesday the 28th day of July, 1908.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, F. S. JAMES, C.M.G.

The Honourable the Acting Financial Commissioner, J. P. SMARTT, Esq.

The Honourable F. C. M. ANSON.

Under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 21 of the above named Ordinance, the following RULES are hereby made and published by the Governor of the Colony with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof:-

RULES FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE CASH ON DELIVERY SERVICE MADE UNDER THE POST OFFICE ORDINANCE.

I.—NATURE OF THE SYSTEM

- 1. The Postmaster-General undertakes, on certain conditions, to collect from the addressee the price of an article sent by post and to remit it to the sender by Money Order or Postal Order.
- 2. The service applies only to parcels (uninsured or insured), insured letters, and registered packets of all kinds sent from Southern Nigeria to the United Kingdom and certain British Possessions (see list in the Imperial Post Office Guide a copy of which is available for reference at any Post Office), and Egypt, and to similar packets sent from those places to Southern Nigeria.
- 3. Until further notice, the "Cash on Delivery system" will apply only to the General Post Office, Lagos, the Post Office, Calabar, and the Post Office, Warri.
- 4. The amount to be collected under the "Cash on Delivery system" is called the "Trade Charge."
- 5. The maximum Trade Charge varies for different countries (see list in the Imperial Post Office Guide), but in no case does it exceed £20.
- 6. A special fee of 3d. is to be charged on every Cash on Delivery packet posted in Southern Nigeria and, in addition, a fee will be charged abroad for the delivery service (see Table in the Imperial Post Office Guide). The maximum Trade Charge in Southern Nigeria is £20 and the delivery fees to be charged in this country on Cash on Delivery packets received from abroad are as follows :--

	ree.
When the Trade Charge does not exceed £5	6d.
When the Trade Charge exceeds £5 but not £10	9d.
When the Trade Charge exceeds £10 but not £15	1s.
When the Trade Charge exceeds £15 but not £20	1s. 3d.

- 7. The fee due to the Office of origin is to be paid at the time of posting. The fee due to the Office of delivery is to be deducted, with the commission on the Money Order or Postal Order, from the amount of the Trade Charge collected from the addressee of a Cash on Delivery packet.
- 8. Packets transmitted to this Colony under the "Cash on Delivery system" will not be sent out by Postmen for delivery. The addressees will be notified of the arrival of such packets and delivery must be taken over the Counter of the Post Office.
- 9. In these Rules the term "packet" shall, unless otherwise stated, include parcels (insured and uninsured) insured letters and registered packets.

II.—ACCEPTANCE.

1. POSTING.

10. Cash on Delivery packets are accepted at the General Post Office, Lagos, the Post Offices, Calabar, and Warri, on the following conditions :-

The sender must-

(a) write on the cover of the packet his name and full address, the amount of British currency of the Trade Charge in figures and words, and the name of the office on which the

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Money Order or Postal Order is to be drawn. These particulars may be written on the back of the packet if there is not room for them to be written clearly on the front. No erasure or alteration of the entry of the amount is allowed. An incorrect entry must be completely obliterated and a fresh entry made:

- (b) fill up a request form (Form C.O.D. No. 1) which is supplied by the Post Office, which includes a declaration that the Cash on Delivery packet is sent in fulfilment of an order. If the sender desires to correct the entry of the Trade Charge he must make out a fresh form.
- (c) prepay the Cash on Delivery fee by affixing 3d. in postage stamps to the request form. The ordinary postage and other charges must, of course, also be prepaid.

He must then hand in the packet at the counter, where he will receive a certificate of posting (see Rule II., 10), which he will be required to give up when he presents the Money Order or Postal Order to be cashed (see Rule VIII. (a)).

2. RELATION OF TRADE CHARGE TO INSURED VALUE.

11. It is not necessary that a Cash on Delivery parcel should be insured, or that, if insured, the amount of the insurance should be the same as the amount of the Trade Charge, but in the case of loss, the amount of indemnity will be governed, without regard to the amount of the Trade Charge, by the ordinary rules relating to parcels, insured letters, or registered packets.

3. PARCELS-RELATION OF TRADE CHARGE TO DECLARED VALUE.

12. The amount of the Trade Charge must not exceed the amount of the declared value together with the postage and the fees payable on the parcel in connexion with the Cash on Delivery Service.

4. ACCEPTANCE FOR POSTING IN PRIVATE BAGS.

13. Cash on Delivery packets cannot be accepted for posting in private bags.

5. CASH ON DELIVERY PACKETS POSTED OUT OF COURSE.

14. If a Cash on Delivery packet is posted out of course in a letter box or left on the counter without the necessary forms, the sender, if he is known, will be communicated with in order that he may comply with the usual procedure in respect of Cash on Delivery packets; and if he declines to do this, or if no reply is received from him within six days, the packet will be returned to him. If he is not known, the packet will be sent to the Returned Letter Office, the reason being written on the cover.

6. IRREGULAR ACCEPTANCE.

15. If a Cash on Delivery packet has been irregularly accepted (1) for a country to which the Cash on Delivery service does not extend, or (2) bearing a Trade Charge which exceeds the maximum prescribed in the country of destination (see Table in the Imperial Post Office Guide), or (3) lacking some essential particulars, it will be treated as indicated below :-

(a) If the irregularity is discovered at the Office of posting, the packet will be returned to the sender, if known, in exchange for the certificate of posting. If the sender is not known, the packet will be sent to the Returned Letter Office, the reason being shown on the cover.

(b) In every case in which the irregularity is discovered at an office other than the Office of posting, the packet will be sent to the Returned Letter Office.

7. REQUEST FORMS.

16. A separate Cash on Delivery Request Form must be made out by the sender for each packet, and in other respects each Cash on Delivery packet must be treated separately. A supply of the Cash on Delivery Request Forms may be furnished to Firms or persons regularly sending Cash on Delivery packets, for preparation before the packets are presented for transmission.

8. CHARGES IN COUNTRY OF DESTINATION.

- 17. (a) The Money Order or Postal Order commission and any Cash on Delivery fee chargeable in the country of destination will be deducted abroad from the amount collected.
- (b) Full particulars, so far as they are shown in the Table in the Imperial Post Office Guide, will be given to the sender if he asks for information. In regard to other charges, such as Customs dues and charges for re-direction, the ordinary procedure will be followed.

9. CONVERSION OF MONEY.

18. Any conversion of money that may be necessary will be effected at the Office of Exchange.

10. CERTIFICATE OF POSTING.

19. A special certificate of posting must be given for each Cash on Delivery packet in substitution for the usual certificate of posting. This Cash on Delivery certificate, as well as the counterfoil, must be filled up by the accepting officer. The amount of the Trade Charge should be written in words, so far as the pounds are concerned. The serial number of the packet should be written on the certificate in the space provided for the purpose.

11. LABELS.

- 20. (a) Every Cash on Delivery packet must have affixed to it an orange-coloured triangular label (C.O.D. Form No. 2) which is supplied by the Post Office, bearing upon it the initials "C.O.D."
- (b) Every parcel must also bear the ordinary parcel post label of the Office of origin, and any other labels required under the ordinary
- (c) Every insured letter or registered packet must bear the usual registration number.

III.—DELIVERY.

1. PAYMENT BEFORE DELIVERY.

21. It is strictly forbidden to give up a Cash on Delivery packet, to open it at the request of the addressee, or to allow the addressee to open it until the Trade Charge and any other charges due have been paid. But the addressee will see from the entry of the packet the name and address of the sender, who (see Rule II., 1 (b)), must have sent the packet in fulfilment of an order.

2. NO RECEIPT.

22. No receipt will be given for the Trade Charge collected on a Cash on Delivery packet.

3. CHEQUES NOT ACCEPTED.

23. Cheques will not be accepted in payment of Trade Charges.

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4. DELIVERY IN SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES.

24. Cash on Delivery packets will not be delivered in private bags unless the amount of the Trade Charge has been previously remitted. In any other cases the packet will be delivered over the counter of the Post Office.

IV.-NON-DELIVERY.

- 1. TREATMENT OF UNDELIVERED PACKET AT DELIVERY OFFICE.
- 25. (a) If the addressee or his representative refuses to pay the Trade Charge, if an answer cannot be obtained, or if, from any other cause, payment of the Trade Charge is not made within a reasonable time, a notice will be sent to the addressee, stating (1) that the packet will be retained at the Office of Delivery for fifteen days exclusive of the day of arrival, during which time it may be obtained on application.
- (b) If at the expiration of fifteen days delivery has not been effected, the packet will be sent to the Returned Letter Office.
- 2. TREATMENT IN RETURNED LETTER OFFICE OR OFFICE OF EXCHANGE.
- 26. (a) Letters, &c .- In case of refusal on the part of the addressee or his representative to pay the Trade Charge, a Cash on Delivery packet, other than a parcel, will be returned to the Post Office of the country of Origin at the first opportunity after it reaches the Returned Letter Office, instead of being retained there for a prescribed period; but the usual period of retention will be observed when the return of the packet results from a cause not connected with the Trade Charge.
- (b) Parcels.-If, after a Cash on Delivery parcel has reached the Returned Letter Office, the sender, on being consulted, has given instructions for it to be presented again, a fee of 3d. for such further presentation is to be collected from the addressee, in addition to any other charges.
- (c) An undelivered packet which has been sent to the Returned Letter Office may be claimed by the addressee at any time prior to its return to the office of origin and delivery effected on payment of a fee of 3d. in addition to all other charges, &c., which may be due thereon.

V .- CANCELLING OR REDUCING TRADE CHARGE AFTER POSTING.

- 1. CERTIFICATE OF POSTING TO BE PRODUCED.
- 27. The sender of a Cash on Delivery packet may arrange for the Trade Charge to be reduced or cancelled, upon payment of a fee of 6d.

In such a case the sender must produce the original Certificate of Posting at the Office at which the packet was posted and fill up and sign the printed Form (Cash on Delivery No. 3,) which is supplied by the Post Office and to which a Postage stamp or stamps in payment of the fee must be affixed.

2. CANCELLING OR REDUCING TRADE CHARGE ON

UNDELIVERED PARCEL.

28. If the sender of a Cash on Delivery parcel desires to reduce or cancel the Trade Charge after he has received from the Returned Letter Office notice of the non-delivery of the parcel, the procedure set forth in Section 1 of the present rule should be followed; but the Cash on Delivery Form No. 3, after completion, should be attached to the notice of non-delivery and sent directly to the Returned Letter Office under registered cover. The notice of non-delivery should be endorsed by the Postmaster to the effect that the amount of the Trade Charge entered on the certificate of posting has been reduced or cancelled, as the case may be.

VI.-RE-DIRECTION.

29. The general rules which apply to the re-direction of parcels, insured letters, and registered packets received from places abroad apply to Cash on Delivery packets; but the following special rules must also be observed :--

1. RE-DIRECTION BEFORE DELIVERY.

30. If the packet has not been delivered no fee will be chargeable for such Cash on Delivery service as is performed in such a case.

2. RE-DIRECTION AFTER DELIVERY.

31. (a) A Cash on Delivery packet which has been delivered may be redirected as a Cash on Delivery packet only if the Cash on Delivery service extends to the Office, Colony or Country in which the new address is situated. In such a case, the further transmission must be regarded as a fresh transaction, so far as the Cash on Delivery service is concerned, a new Request Form must be prepared and a new Cash on Delivery fee must be paid. Care must then be taken that all marks relating to the original Cash on Delivery service are erased from the packet. No further charge for postage should, however, be made in those circumstances in which re-direction is free under existing rules.

(b) A Cash on Delivery packet delivered at its place of original address may, however, be re-directed as an ordinary postal packet; but care must be taken that all entries and marks proper to the Cash on

Delivery service are covered over or completely erased,

3. RE-DIRECTED PACKET IRREGULARLY POSTED.

32. A Cash on Delivery packet which, after delivery, is irregularly posted in a letter box to be re-transmitted without Cash on Delivery service, will be treated like any other parcel or registered packet irregularly posted; but all special Cash on Delivery entries, labels, &c., should be effaced.

VII.—REMITTANCE OF TRADE CHARGE TO THE SENDER OF THE PACKET BY MONEY ORDER OR POSTAL ORDER.

- 1. AMOUNT TO BE REMITTED BY POSTMASTER OF DELIVERY OFFICE.
- 33. (a) When the Trade Charge has been received from the addressee. the Postmaster will remit the amount to the sender by means of a Money Order or Postal Order drawn in his favour on the Office which was specified on the packet, deducting from the amount the Money Order or Postal Order Commission at the usual rate, and also a fee for the Cash on Delivery service according to the following scale:-

When the Trade Charge does not exceed £5 When the Trade Charge exceeds £5 but not £10 9d. When the Trade Charge exceeds £10 but not £15... ... 1s. When the Trade Charge exceeds £15 but not £20 ... 1s. 3d.

(b) Postal Orders (with stamps affixed to make up odd amounts up to five pence) will be used where possible for remitting the amount to the sender whenever, after the authorised deductions (collection fee and poundage on Order), the amount to be remitted does not exceed £2. 2s. 10d. the maximum amount which can be remitted by two Postal Orders with stamps affixed.

VIII.-PAYMENT OF MONEY ORDER OR POSTAL ORDER TO SENDER OF PACKET.

34. (a) The sender of a Cash on Delivery packet will receive in a closed envelope a Money Order or Postal Order representing the Trade Charge collected abroad less the Commission on the Money Order or Postal

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Order and the fee charged in the country from which the money was remitted. The Order will bear the letters "C.O.D." and the serial number, and, before payment, the sender must give up the Certificate of Posting (see Rule II. 1). If, however, the Order be presented by a Banker, it will not be necessary to produce the Certificate of Posting.

(b) If the Certificate of Posting cannot be produced, payment will be refused and the Postmaster-General must be communicated with.

IX.-INCIDENTAL SERVICES.

- 35. (a) Cash on Delivery packets are, in other respects than those above specified, treated like other parcels, insured letters, and registered packets-e.g., as regards registration, insurance, compensation, advice of delivery, and undertaking to pay Customs charges. If Customs charges are prepaid, the parcel must be marked "To be delivered free of all charges except Trade Charge."
- (b) If the sender of a Cash on Delivery packet desires to have an advice of the delivery of a registered or insured packet, or undertakes to pay Customs charges, he should require the necessary entries to be made by the Postmaster on the Certificate of Posting.
- 36. The foregoing Rules shall come into operation on 1st October, 1908.

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

- 4. A Table is given in the Post Office Guide showing the Fees (including Money Order or Postal Order Commission) chargeable abroad, which will be deducted from the amount of the Trade Charge collected.

POSTAL REGULATIONS FOR THE No. 825.] COLONY OF SOUTHERN NIGERIA

THE COLONIAL POSTMASTER UNDER SECTION 21 OF

THE POST OFFICE ORDINANCE. [Statute Laws Revision Ordinance 1908, First Schedule, Chapter CXXIV.]

Approved by the Governor in Council on the 14th day of July, 1908.

I.—INLAND CORRESPONDENCE.

1. The term "Inland Correspondence" means correspondence posted within the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria and addressed to some place in the Colony and Protectorate of Southern

Inland Correspondence is divided into the following classes :-

(a) Letters.

(b) Post-cards. (c) Printed Papers and Book Packets (including newspapers).

(a) Parcels.

A.-LETTER POST.

2. The prepaid rate of postage is as follows:-Not exceeding 1 oz. in weight ... 1d.

For every additional 1 oz. ... 1d.

A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage; a letter insufficiently paid, with double the deficiency.

No letter may exceed two feet in length, one foot in width, or one foot in depth.

B .- POST-CARDS. 3. The prepaid rate of postage on every post-card is one half-penny, and on every reply post-card one penny. A Post-card posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with a postage of one penny.

Cards used as post-cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the material used for the thickest official post-card, and not thinner than the material used for the thinnest. They may not exceed 51 inches in length by 31 inches in width, or be less than 4 inches in length by 23 inches in width.

5. Nothing may be attached to a post-card except :-

 (a) Stamps in payment of postage or stamp duty; (b) A gummed label (not to exceed 2 inches long and 3 inch wide), bearing the name and address of the person to whom the card is sent;

Inland Post-Printed Papers and Parcels.

(c) A similar label bearing the name and address of the sender of

(d) Engravings, illustrations, drawings, and photographs, on very thin paper and completely adherent to the card.

6. The articles specified in paragraphs (c) and (d) may be affixed either to the back of the card or to the left hand half of the address side. The right hand half of the address side is reserved exclusively for the postage stamp and the address.

7. A post-card may not be folded, nor may it be cut or altered in such a way as to reduce the size below 4 by 24 inches.

A post-card may not be fastened against inspection in any way, or enclosed in a cover of any kind.

If any of the rules relating to a post-card be infringed, the card will be treated as a letter.

C .- PRINTED PAPERS AND BOOK PACKET POST.

8. The prepaid rate of postage is as follows:-

Not exceeding 2 ozs. ...

For every additional 2 ozs. \frac{1}{2}d.

Printed or written matter not in the nature of a letter, and printed or written on paper or some substance ordinarily used for printing or writing, may be transmitted by this post.

(i) SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

9. (a) The postage must be prepaid. If posted unpaid the packet is chargeable with double the original postage.

A Printed Paper or Book packet may not exceed 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in width or depth.

(c) Every Printed Paper or Book packed is subject to examination in the post.

(d) Every Printed Paper or Book packet must be posted either without a cover, or in an unfastened envelope, or in a cover which can be easily removed for the purpose of examination without breaking any seal or tearing any paper, or separating any adhering surfaces. A packet posted without a cover may not be fastened or otherwise treated so as to prevent easy examination.

(e) No Printed Paper or Book packet may contain or bear any communication in the nature of a letter not expressly allowed by these rules.

10. If any of the rules relating to a Printed Paper or Book packet be infringed, the packet will be treated as a letter.

D.-PARCEL POST.

(i) RATES AND WEIGHT.

11. The rates of postage on parcels are as follows:-

For a parcel not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight exceeding 3 lbs. in weight and 0 11 not exceeding 7 lbs. 7 lbs. and not exceeding 11 lbs. 1

No parcel may exceed 11 lbs. in weight.

12. The size allowed for an Inland Parcel is :-

3 feet 6 inches Greatest length

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Foreign and Colonial Post—Redirection—Undelivered Parcels.

(i)-ORDINARY CORRESPONDENCE.

- (a) No additional postage will be charged upon ordinary correspondence if re-posted not later than the day after delivery.
- (b) This principle however does not exempt from additional postage correspondence which, though fully prepaid for the first transmission, is re-directed to a country to which the postage is higher than that originally prepaid.

(ii) REGISTERED CORRESPONDENCE.

- (a) Registered letters or packets, on being re-directed, may not he dropped into a Letter Box, but must be taken to a Post Office to be dealt with as registered. No additional postage or registration fee will be charged upon them if the correspondence is presented for re-registration not later than the day after delivery; but if it is presented after that time, it will be treated as freshly posted, and fresh postage and registration fees will be payable.
- (b) Correspondence either ordinary or registered which appears to have been opened and tampered with will be chargeable as freshly posted and unpaid.

(iii) -PARCELS.

117. Parcels arriving in this country and re-directed from one address to another in the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria are liable to additional postage at the Inland rate for each re-direction except where the original and second address are both within the delivery of the same Post Office and the re-direction is made within the period of free re-direction. A parcel will not, however, be delivered free of charge to a person who has previously refused to accept it and for re-direction from a Returned Letter Office a second postage is invariably charged.

118. In the case of parcels for Government Officers who have been removed from one Station to another in the Colony, no re-direction fee will be charged where such parcels are re-directed within two months of the date of such Officers leaving the station to which the parcels were originally addressed.

119. A parcel re-directed from one country to another is charged the full postage.

C .- UNDELIVERED PARCELS.

120. If a parcel addressed to a place abroad cannot be delivered the sender is advised, provided that his address is given on the parcel or on the forms prepared by him at the time of posting, and his instructions for the disposal of the parcel are then communicated to the Post Office at which the parcel is lying.

121. Parcels returned from one country to another incur fresh postage at the ordinary rates, and payment of the postage in advance may be required.

122. A parcel received from abroad which is unclaimed or cannot be delivered within 6 months of the date of its arrival is, unless of a perishable nature, either returned to the sender, if he so requests, or disposed of in such a manner as the Postmaster-General thinks fit.

Foreign and Colonial Post-Late Fees-Registration.

D .- LATE FEES.

123. Correspondence which is too late for the advertised time for the closing of a mail will be accepted under the following conditions:-

IN THE EASTERN AND CENTRAL PROVINCES.

- (i) Ordinary Letters with a prepaid late fee of 1d. in addition to the ordinary postage will be accepted to within 45 minutes of the advertised time of the steamers departure.
- (ii) Registered Letters with a prepaid fee of 4d., in addition to the ordinary postage and registration fee, will be accepted to within two hours of the advertised time of the steamers departure.

IN THE WESTERN PROVINCE.

(iii) Registered Letters with a prepaid late fee of 4d. in addition to the ordinary postage and registration fee, will be accepted only at the General Post Office, Lagos, during the hours of 4 to 6 p.m., on the advertised dates for the closing of mails by the regular mail steamers.

Note .- All late fee letters must be handed in over the counter of the Post Office and not posted in a letter box.

E .- POSTAL NOTICES.

124. The latest information in connection with the despatch and arrival of Foreign and Colonial mails, &c., will be regularly supplied to subscribers thereto

125. The annual subscription payable in advance, is 6s. per annum or any part thereof. Subscriptions become due on 1st January in each year, and if not renewed within 15 days of that date the supply will be discontinued.

G.—SUPPLEMENTAL SERVICES,

A .- REGISTRATION.

126. Registration is applicable to all correspondence, except Parcels, subject to the limitations referred to in the Imperial Post Office Guide.

127. Parcels for places abroad cannot be registered, although in many cases they may be insured.

128. The fee chargeable for Registration to places abroad is 2d.

(i)-INDEMNITY FOR LOSS.

129. Except in cases beyond control (e.g., tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, and war) the Postmaster-General undertakes to pay an indemnity of £2 or 50 francs when it is proved to his satisfaction that a letter or packet duly admitted to Registration has been entirely lost whilst in his custody.

(ii) - CONDITIONS OF REGISTRATION.

130. No article addressed to initials or in pencil is admitted to Registration.

131. Every letter presented for Registration must be enclosed in a strong envelope, securely fastened.

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Foreign and Colonial Post-Insurance.

132. No registered article marked on the outside with the declared value of the contents may be sent to a country of the Postal Union unless it is insured and Postmasters are instructed to refuse to receive articles which are so marked.

133. Registered articles must be prepaid as regards both postage and registration fee.

134. Articles to be registered must be given to an officer of the Pest Office, and a receipt obtained for them; they must on no account be dropped into a Letter Box.

(iii)-ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF DELIVERY.

135. The sender of registered or insured correspondence addressed to any Foreign Country or British Colony in the Postal Union, or of an insured parcel addressed to any place to which the insurance system extends, may obtain an acknowledgment of its delivery on application at the office of posting, either at the time of posting or subsequently. The fee is 2½d, which must be paid on application by stamps affixed by the sender to a form provided for the purpose. Inquiry as to the alleged loss or non-delivery of a registered or insured packet or insured parcel should also be accompanied by a fee of 2½d, and should, if possible, be made upon the form used in applying for an acknowledgment of delivery. If it is found that the postal service is in fault, the inquiry fee will be refunded.

B. - INSURANCE.

136. The insurance system applies to Akassa, Bonny, Brass, Calabar, Degema, Forcados, Idah, Ibadan, Lagos, Onitsha, Opobo, Sapele and Warri only.

137. The limits of insurance vary in the different countries and British Possessions; limits for which letters and parcels can be insured are shown in the Imperial Post Office Guide.

138. Subject to the foregoing paragraph, the maximum limit for which postal packets can be accepted in this country for insurance is £120, and the fees payable for insurance are 5d. for the first £12, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each succeeding £12, or part thereof where the packet is transmitted to the United Kingdom or the West African Colonies, but where postal packets are forwarded to the United Kingdom for transmission to other countries, a fresh insurance becomes payable for each transmission.

139. Insured letters and parcels have all the safeguards of the registration system; and subject to the following regulations, compensation will be paid if they or any of their contents are lost in the post.


140. The letters to which the insurance system is applicable are those which contain bank notes, bonds, coupons, securities and other documents of the kind. Post-cards, Packets of Printed Papers, or "Commercial Papers," Sample, Packets, or Letters which contain articles other than documents, cannot be insured.

141. Objects of value which cannot be sent in insured letters may, in most cases, be forwarded by Insured Parcel.

142. Letters intended for insurance must be presented at the counter of a Post Office. They must not be dropped into a Letter Box or handed to a Postman or Mail Guard. Insured letters must not be addressed to initials or in pencil.

Foreign and Colonial Post—Insurance.

143. Every letter tendered for insurance must be enclosed in a strong cover, which must be securely fastened and sealed with fine wax, in such a way that it cannot be opened without either breaking the seals or leaving obvious traces of violation. Envelopes with black or coloured borders must not be used. Seals must be placed over each flap or seam of the cover of a packet; and if the packet is tied round with string or tape, a seal must be placed on the ends where they are tied. The seals on an ordinary envelope should be placed as shewn below:—



144. All the seals on an insured letter or parcel must be of the same kind of wax (or lead in the case of parcels), and must bear distinct impressions of the same private device. Coins must not be used for sealing; and the device must not consist merely of straight, crossed, or curved lines which could readily be imitated.

145. Parcels containing coin or bullion (not to exceed £5 in value, except in the case of coins clearly intended for purposes of ornament), watches, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver, must be enclosed in strong boxes or cases, which must be sewn up, or otherwise fastened, in wrappers of linen, canvas, strong paper, or other substantial material. In such cases, the seals must be placed along the edges of each joint or loose flap at distances not more than three inches apart. The address of such parcels must be written on their actual covering.

146. If a letter or parcel tendered for insurance does not, in the opinion of the officer of the Post Office to whom it is tendered, fulfil the foregoing conditions as to packing and sealing, it is his duty to refuse to insure it. Nevertheless, the onus of properly enclosing, packing, and sealing the packet lies upon the sender; and the Post Office assumes no liability for loss arising from defects which may not be observed at the time of posting.

147. The amount for which a letter or parcel is insured must be written by the sender both in words and in figures at the top of the address side of the cover, thus:—"Insured for fifteen pounds (£15). No alteration or erasure of the inscription is allowed. If a mistake is made, the entry must be completely obliterated and an entirely new one made by the sender. The amount must also, in the case of a parcel, be entered on the despatch-note, if one is used. When the insured letter or parcel is addressed to a Foreign Country, the currency in which is different to that in Southern Nigeria, the amount for which it is insured must also be expressed in francs and centimes. This conversion must be effected by the Post Office.

148. No letter or parcel can be insured for more than its actual value, or for more than the sum entered in the Table of Rates against the name of the Country or Colony to which it is addressed referred to in the Imperial Post Office Guide. A letter or parcel, the contents of which have no saleable value may, however, be insured for a nominal sum in order to obtain the safeguards of the registration system. Over Insurance is an obstacle to compensation.

149. The fee must be prepaid, in addition to the full postage, by means of postage stamps, which the sender must affix to the cover. As

THE PRISONS ORDINANCE.

(Statute Laws Revision Ordinance, Schedule 1, Chapter XXIV.)

At a meeting of the Executive Council, held at Government House, Lagos, on Friday, the 5th day of June, 1908.

UNDER and by virtue of the provisions of section 9 of the above named Ordinance, the following rules are hereby made and published by the Governor of the Colony with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof:—

RULES TO BE OBSERVED IN ALL PRISONS IN THE COLONY AND PROTEC-TORATE WITH REGARD TO THE CUSTODY OF CONDEMNED PRISONERS.

- 1. In all cases when Sentence of Death has been passed on a Prisoner, the Chief Warder or Keeper of Prisons shall cause him to be thoroughly searched (in the case of a Female Prisoner by the Matron) and shall remove from him any article which it is considered dangerous or inexpedient for him to retain in his possession.
- 2. Every Prisoner sentenced to Death, shall be confined in some safe place within the Prison and, if possible, apart from all other Prisoners, and shall be placed under the constant charge and observation of two Officers of the Prison both by day and night, (in case of a Female Prisoner, the attendants should be Females) and no Keys are to be left with the Guards.

Foreign and Colonial Post-Insurance.

few stamps as possible should be used to prepay the postage and insurance fee. They must not be folded over the edge of the cover, and when more stamps than one are used, they must be affixed with spaces between them.

- 150. A certificate of posting must always be obtained by the sender, who may also obtain an acknowledgment of the delivery of a letter, on application at the office of posting, either at the time or subsequently.
- 151. Letters bearing on the outside a declaration of the value of the contents cannot be transmitted by post to places abroad unless they are insured.
- 152. Parcels containing Coin, Watches, Jewellery, or any article of gold or silver, unless insured for at least part of their value, and for as much of the journey as the regulations permit, cannot be sent by Parcel Post. Any such parcel posted uninsured will generally be returned to the sender.
- 153. A compulsory registration fee of 4d. will be collected on the delivery of every uninsured parcel received from places abroad and found to contain coin, watches, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver.
- 154. Letters which, although addressed to a country or place to which the insurance system does not extend, have been irregularly insured, will be forwarded as registered letters; and if they or their contents are lost in the post, the regulations as to the compensation payable in the case of registered letters will be applicable.
- 155. Compensation for the loss in the post of a letter or its contents, or for the loss or damage of a parcel, will not exceed the amount of the actual loss or damage, and will not be paid for at all for a packet containing any prohibited article, or for any packet which has been delivered without external trace of injury and has been accepted without remark; nor does it follow as a matter of course that compensation will be given when loss arises from tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, war, or other causes beyond control. No claim for compensation will be admitted if made more than a year after the packet was posted. The sender of a parcel may waive his claim in favour of the addressee.
- 156. No legal liability to give compensation in respect of any packet for which an insurance fee has been paid attaches to the Postmaster-General, either personally or in his official capacity. The final decision upon all questions of compensation rests with the Postal Administration of the country in which the loss has taken place.
- 157. The insurance system also applies to letters and parcels from the countries which are parties to the insurance system, but those from other places abroad cannot be insured. Letters for H.M. ships abroad cannot be insured even when they are addressed to a port to which the insured letter system extends.
- 158. Any insurance effected contrary to the foregoing regulations is invalid.
- 159. All Postal regulations heretofore in force in the Colony and Protectorates of Southern Nigeria relating to the subject matter of the foregoing Regulations are hereby revoked.

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Inland Post-Parcels-Prohibited Articles.

Greatest length and girth combined 6 feet.

For example :-

A parcel measuring 3 feet 6 inches in its longest dimensions may measure as much as 2 feet 6 inches in girth, i.e., round its thickest part; or a short parcel may be thicker; thus, if it measure no more than 3 feet in length, it may measure as much as 3 feet in girth, i.e., round its thickest part.

(iii) PREPAYMENT AND POSTING.

13. The postage on a parcel must be prepaid.

14. A parcel should not be posted in a letter box. It should be presented at the counter of a Post Office, and the sender should see that the weight, size and postage are in order before leaving. If posted irregularly, it will :-

(1) If fully prepaid at the rate applicable to any other post and admissible by that post be forwarded as a letter, printed paper or book packet.

(2) If insufficiently prepaid at the rate applicable to any other post, but otherwise admissible by that post, be charged with double the deficiency or with deficient postage at the Parcel Post rate together with a fine of a penny, whichever is the

A certificate of posting may be obtained for an unregistered parcel.

Parcels are neither accepted for transmission nor delivered on Sundays.

(iv.) ADDRESSES.

15. (a) The address of a parcel must be clearly written in English in characters in ordinary use in Southern Nigeria. A parcel bearing an address otherwise written will not be accepted unless a translation of the address can be added.

(b) The address should be written on the parcel itself, and not merely on a label, which may become detached.

(c) The sender's address should appear either inside the parcel or on the cover. In the latter case it must be kept distinct from the address to which the parcel is sent.

E.—GENERAL POSTAL RULES.

A .- PROHIBITED ARTICLES.

16. The transmission through post of the following articles is prohibited :-

Any postal packet :-

(1) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or an indecent or obscene article,

(2) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character;

(3) Consisting of or containing:

(a) Any explosive substance,

(b) Any dangerous substance,

Inland Post-Packing-Redirection.

(c) Any filth.

(d) Any noxious or deleterious substance,

(e) Any sharp instrument not properly protected,

(f) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature,

(g) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other postal packets in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such packet; or

(4) Containing or bearing any fictitious postage stamp; or

(5) Purporting to be prepaid with any stamp which has been previcusly used to prepay any other postal packet or any other revenue duty or tax; or

(6) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, letters, or marks (used without due authority) which signify, or imply, or may reasonably lead the recipient thereof to believe that the postal packet is sent on His Majesty's Service;

(7) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks or designs of a character likely, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, to embarrass the officers of the Post Office in dealing with the packet in the post;

(8) Of such a form or so made up for transmission by post as to be likely, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, to embarrass the officers of the Post Office in dealing with the packet in the post.

Prohibited articles, if tendered for transmission, will be refused, or if detected in transit, detained. They are liable to be dealt with in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct, and the sender is in some cases liable to prosecution.

17. Insecurely packed packets come within the category of articles "likely to injure other postal packets in course of conveyance" and will not be accepted for transmission by post.

B .- MAKE UP OF CORRESPONDENCE.

18. Parcels must be so packed and Correspondence of every kind must be so made up as not only to preserve the contents from loss or damage in the post, but also not to injure other correspondence.

Any letter or parcel containing anything of a fragile nature should be marked or labelled "Fragile."

C .- RE-DIRECTION,

19. Correspondence may be re-directed to the same addressee at another address either by an Officer of the Post Office or by an agent of the addressee after delivery, under the following rules:-

(i) ORDINARY CORRESPONDENCE INCLUDING PARCELS.

(a) Correspondence including parcels, is re-transmitted by post without additional charge. In the case of re-direction by the addressee's agent, the correspondence must be re-posted, not later than the day after delivery (Sundays and public holidays not being counted), and must not, previous to re-direction, be opened or tampered with.

(b) Re-directed correspondence (including parcels) which is re-posted later than the day after delivered will be liable to

be charged for at the prepaid rate. Correspondence which appears to have been opened or tampered with will be chargeable as freshly posted and unpaid.

- (c) Whenever it may be thought necessary, a receipt may be required from the addressee of a re-directed letter, packet or parcel at the second address.
 - (ii.) REGISTERED CORRESPONDENCE.

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Correspondence.

- (a) Registered correspondence, on being re-directed, may not be dropped into a letter box, but must be taken to a Post Office to be dealt with as registered. No additional registration fee will be charged if the correspondence is presented for reregistration not later than the day after delivery; but if it is presented after that time it will be treated as freshly posted, and fresh registration fees will be payable. As regards postage, the rules given above apply.
- (b) If any registered packet when re-directed, instead of being given back to the Post Office to be dealt with as registered, is dropped into a letter box, it is treated in all respects as a letter intended for registration but irregularly posted (see page 7 paragraph 35 (a).)

(iii) OFFICIAL RE-DIRECTION.

Notices of removal and applications for correspondence, including parcels, to be re-directed, must in all cases be duly signed by the persons to whom the letters are to be addressed. Such notices and applications should be given to the local Postmaster.

D .- POSTE RESTANTE.

- 20. The Poste Restante is intended solely for the accommodation of strangers and travellers, and even they may not use the Poste Restante for more than two months.
- 21. The words "to be called for" or "Poste Restante" should appear in the address of correspondence intended for the Poste Restante.
- 22. Correspondence addressed to initials, or to fictitious names, or to a christian name without a surname, is not taken in at the Poste Restante, but is sent at once to the Returned Letter Office for disposal.
- 23. Correspondence may not be re-directed from a private address to a Poste Restante in the same town.
- 24. All persons applying for Poste Restante correspondence must furnish sufficient particulars to prevent mistakes and to ensure the delivery of the correspondence to the person to whom it properly belongs.
- 25. Letters, &c., addressed to a Post Office at a seaport town for a person on board a ship expected to arrive at that port are kept two months.
- 26. At the expiry of two months, correspondence addressed to the Poste Restante or to be called for is sent to the Returned Letter Office for disposal.
- 27. Poste Restante correspondence, however, which bears a request for its return within a specified time (not exceeding the Official period

of retention), if not delivered, is dealt with in accordance with such

- E .- PERIOD OF RETENTION OF UNDELIVERED CORRESPONDENCE.
- 28. Correspondence from places abroad which is not delivered within two months after its arrival is sent to the Returned Letter Office for disposal.
- 29. Correspondence posted internally is kept for one month, after which it is sent to the Returned Letter Office for disposal.
- 30. Correspondence, the addressees of which have refused to take delivery, is sent at once to the Returned Letter Office for disposal.

F .- DISPOSAL OF UNDELIVERED CORRESPONDENCE.

(i) LETTERS.

- 31. An undelivered inland letter, bearing the full name and address of the sender printed or written upon the outside, shall be returned direct and unopened. Other undelivered inland letters shall be sent to the Returned Letter Office, where they are opened and returned, if containing the full name and address of the senders. If they contain neither sender's name and address nor any enclosure of importance, they shall be destroyed. Letters found to contain anything of value are to be recorded, and, if returned, are to be conpulsorily registered. Letters from abroad are returned unopened to the country of origin after a brief detention in the Returned Letter Office.
 - (ii) POST-CARDS, PRINTED PAPERS AND BOOKS PACKETS.
- 32. Undelivered post-cards, printed papers and book packets are dealt with as follows.
 - (1) Those bearing on the outside the name and address of the sender with a request for their return in case of non-delivery, are sent back direct from the office of destination.
 - (2) Those bearing on the outside no request for return in case of non-delivery are disposed of,

(iii) PARCELS.

- 33. Parcels remaining undelivered for one month will be advertised in the Government Gazette and if not claimed within one month from the date of publication, they will be dealt with as follows:-
 - (i) The sender of a parcel bearing his name and address will be communicated with as to its disposal and if returned to him a fresh rate of postage will be charged thereon, payment for which may be required in advance.
 - (ii) A parcel which has not the name and address of the sender is disposed of as the Postmaster-General may decide.
 - (iii) Perishable articles will be dealt with as may be requisite.

F.—SUPPLEMENTAL SERVICES.

A .- REGISTRATION.

34. Correspondence of any kind (including parcels) can be registered.

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Inland Post-Registration-Compensation.

The ordinary registration fee is 2d, in addition to the postage.

(i) INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGISTERING.

35. (a) Everything intended for registration must be handed to an officer of the Post Office, and a certificate of posting, bearing an acknowledgment that the fee for registration and compensation has been paid, must be obtained. Nothing intended for registration must be dropped into a letter box. If, contrary to this rule, a packet bearing the word "Registered," or any other word, phrase, or mark to the like effect, is dropped into a letter box, it will be compulsorily registered (see paragraph 38).

(b) The packet must be made up in a reasonably strong cover appropriate to its contents, and must be fastened with wax, gum, or other adhesive matter. It is not sufficient merely to tie the packet with string. This does not, of course apply to post-cards, or to printed papers and book packets prepaid at 1d. rate which must be open for inspection whether registered or not.

(c) If it be desired to secure compensation for damage to a packet (other than a parcel), the packet must bear the words "Fragile, with care." These words should appear on the face of the cover above the address. Any officer to whom a packet is tendered for registration is to refuse to register it, if the packing is, in his opinion, obviously inadequate. Compensation may, however, be refused if the packet is accepted and afterwards found to have been imperfectly packed.

(d) The address of the packet must be clearly written in English, in characters in ordinary use in Southern Nigeria. A packet bearing an address otherwise written will not be accepted unless a translation of the address can be added. The packet must be marked in the bottom lefthand corner with the word "Registered," and, when the fee exceeds 2d., with the amount of the fee proper to the value up to which the sender desires to secure compensation, (see page 8 paragraph 41) thus:-Registered, 4d; Registered, 8d;

(ii) ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF DELIVERY OF REGISTERED CORRESPONDENCE.

36. The sender of registered correspondence may obtain an acknowledgment of its delivery on application at the office of posting, either at the time of posting or subsequently. The fee is 21d. which must be paid on application, by stamps affixed by the sender to a form provided for the purpose.

37. Enquiry as to the alleged loss or non-delivery of a registered packet should also be accompanied by a fee of 21d. and should, if possible, be made upon the form used in applying for an acknowledgment of delivery. If it is found that the Post Office is in fault, the enquiry fee will be refunded.

(iii) COMPULSORY REGISTRATION.

38. Packets which contain Coin or Jewellery and also all Inland correspondence bearing the word, "Registered," or any other word, phrase, or mark to the like effect, written or impressed on the cover are. if posted without registration, subjected to Compulsory Registration, and are charged on delivery with a registration fee of 4d., less any amount prepaid for registration.

39. Any packet which is found open in the post, or cannot be delivered, and which is found to contain an uncrossed postal order in which the name of the payee has not been inserted, a cheque or dividend warrant not crossed or made payable to order, a banknote, postage stamps, or any article (other than coin or jewellery), of a value in each Inland Post-Compensation.

case exceeding 10s. will be subject to registration, and be chargeable with a registration fee of 2d.

No compensation is given in respect of correspondence compulsorily

B .- COMPENSATION FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.

40. The Postmaster-General is not legally liable for any loss or inconvenience which may arise from the loss, damage, delay, non-delivery, or mis-delivery of anything sent by post, and he does not, in any circumstances, pay compensation in respect of unregistered letters, post-cards, printed papers, or book packets. But subject to the rules stated below, he pays compensation voluntarily and as an act of grace for correspondence of the following descriptions:-

(i) REGISTERED CORRESPONDENCE (INCLUDING PARCELS).

41. The fees payable over and above the postage, and the respective limits of compensation, are as follows:-

These fees include the ordinary registration fee of 2d.

The highest amount of compensation payable is £120.

42. Compensation in respect of money of any kind (Coin, Notes, Orders, Cheques, Stamps, &c.,) will only be given in those cases in which the money is enclosed in one of the Registered Letter envelopes sold by the Post Office and the packet is tendered for transmission by Registered Letter Post. The compensation given in respect of Coin will in no case exceed £5.

43. Compensation for damage to a packet sent by Registered Letter Post will only be given in those cases in which the packet is conspicuously marked with the words "Fragile with Care."

44. No application for compensation in respect of loss or damage of any Postal article will be entertained unless made within one year of the date of posting; after this term the applicant has no right to any compensation.

(ii) UNREGISTERED PARCELS.

45. The maximum limit of compensation is £1.

No compensation is given in respect of Money of any kind sent by Parcel Post, whether registered or unregistered, or in respect of Jewellery (Watches, Jewels, Gold, Silver, &c.) sent by Parcel Post unregistered.

46. In order to secure compensation in respect of the loss of a Parcel, a Certificate of Posting should be obtained by the sender when the parcel is posted.

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(iii) GENERAL RULES.

- 47. (a) It must appear that the loss or damage occurred in the post and did not arise wholly or in part by the fault of the sender, as for instance, from insufficient packing, inadequate fastenings, loss of
- "tie-on" label, &c. (b) The compensation given will not exceed the value of the article lost or the damage sustained. The right is reserved of reinstating the contents of the packet instead of giving pecuniary compensation.
- (c) In the case of damage or loss of contents the packet should be retained for inspection as nearly as possible in the state in which it was delivered. If complaint be made that the contents of the packet have been abstracted, the cover must be produced. After the delivery of a packet has been effected no claim for compensation in respect thereof will be entertained.
- (d) In the case of Bank Note, Money and Postal Orders, Cheques, Bonds, and similar documents, particulars sufficient for their identification must be furnished.
- (e) No compensation either for loss or damage is given in respect of a packet containing anything not legally transmissible by post or a packet not posted in the manner prescribed; or in respect of glass, crockery, greases, liquids or semi-liquids, colouring powders, eggs, fish, meat, fruit, or vegetables sent by Letter Post.
- (f) No compensation is given for damage to any packet (whether sent by Letter Post or Parcel Post) containing eggs, soft fruit, any liquid or semi-liquid, or articles of an exceptionally fragile nature.
- (g) No compensation is given for injury or damage consequential upon, ie., indirectly arising from, the loss, damage, delay, non-delivery, or mis-delivery of anything sent by post.
- (h) Without prejudice to any of the preceding rules, the Postmaster-General will, if he thinks fit, refuse to give compensation for loss or damage on any ground on which a common carrier might in like case claim exemption from legal liability.
- (i) The final decision upon all questions of compensation rests with the Governor.
 - 48. In the Rules as to Registration and Compensation-

The term "money" means and includes-

(a) Coin. (b) Paper money.

The term "Coin" means and includes coins of all kinds, whether or not current in Southern Nigeria or elsewhere.

The term "paper money" means and includes:-

- (a) Notes of the Bank of England or Bank of Ireland, or of any bank of issue in the United Kingdom, and notes current in any Foreign State or British Possession.
- (b) Money Orders and Postal Orders.
- (c) Unobliterated postage or revenue stamps.
- (d) Exchequer bills, bank post bills, bills of exchange, promissory notes, cheques, credit notes which entitle the holder to money or goods, and all orders and authorities for the payment of money whether negotiable or not.
- (e) Bonds, coupons, and securities for money whether negotiable

The term "jewellery" means and includes:-

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- (a) Gold or silver in a manufactured or unmanufactured state (not electro or other plated goods).
- (b) Watches and jewels, but not the works of a watch if of no intrinsic value.
- (c) Diamonds and precious stones; and
- (d) Any article of a like nature which, apart from the workmanship, has an intrinsic or marketable value.

G .- MISCELLANEOUS.

(i)-verification of surcharges.

- 49. When a person to whom correspondence has been delivered has reason to think that it has been improperly charged as being over weight, it should be taken to a Post Office to be weighed before being opened. Unless this course is followed, no question as to the correctness of the surcharges can afterwards be entertained.
 - (ii) EXCEPTIONAL DETENTION OF CERTAIN CORRESPONDENCE.
- 50. The Postmaster-General has power to delay the despatch or delivery of Printed Papers and Book Packets, Post-cards, and Parcels, when it is necessary to do so in order to secure the due despatch of the letter mails, and also to delay parcels when he considers it expedient for their safety and protection to do so.

(iii) POSTMASTERS AND THE PUBLIC.

- 51. No information can be given respecting letters or any other postal packets except to the persons to whom they are addressed, and in no other way is official information of a private character allowed to be made public.
- 52. Officers of the Post Office are not allowed to return any letter. parcel, or other postal packet to the writer or sender or to any one else or to delay forwarding it to its destination according to the address, even though such a request be written thereon.
- 53. Postal Officials are not bound to make change when receiving a payment although they are instructed to meet the requirements of the public in this respect as far as may be practicable and when money is paid at the Post Office, whether as change or otherwise, no question as to its right amount, goodness, or weight can be entertained after it has been removed from the counter.

(iv) EVASION OF POSTAGE.

- 54. Nothing sent through the post may contain an enclosure which is directed to a name and an address different from the name and address borne on the cover, and which is enclosed with the intention of evading postage. Any such forbidden enclosure if observed, is liable to be taken out and forwarded to the addressee, charged with separate postage at the prepaid rate.
 - (v) RETURN OF CORRESPONDENCE.
- 55. The first duty of Postmaster-General is to deliver correspondence as addressed, and he cannot intercept correspondence once posted, or return it to the senders.

(vi) ADDRESSING CORRESPONDENCE.

56. (a) All correspondence should be clearly and legibly addressed, and the stamp or stamps should be affixed at the top right-hand corner

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(b) Abbreviated Addresses registered for Telegrams should not be

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used for letters. (c) Nothing may be written or printed on the address-side of correspondence which, either by tending to prevent the easy and quick reading of the address, or by inconvenient proximity to the postage stamps, or in any way, is likely to embarrass the Post Office in dealing with it. Contravention of this regulation may result in correspondence being withheld from delivery.

(vii) HOURS OF BUSINESS.

57. All Post Offices are open to the Public for the transaction of business between the hours of 8 a.m. and 11 a.m., and 1 p.m. and 4 p.m., except on Saturdays, when the hours observed are 8 a.m. to 12 noon, and at such other times as the closing and delivery of mails may necessitate, due notice of which is in each case given to the public.

(viii) EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS OF THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT.

58. Subject to certain exceptions, the Postal Department possesses by virtue of the Post Office Ordinance, the exclusive privilege of carrying letters from place to place, and of performing all incidental services such as those of collecting and delivering letters.

The exceptions are:-

(a) Letters sent by a private friend in his way, journey, or travel, so as such letters be delivered to the party to whom they shall be directed.

(b) Letters sent by a messenger on purpose, concerning the private affairs or business of the sender or receiver thereof.

(c) Commissions or returns thereof, and affidavits and writs, process or proceedings, or returns thereof, issuing out of a Court of Justice.

(d) Letters to be sent out of the Colony by a vessel (not being a

packet boat.) (e) Letters of merchants, owners of vessels of merchandize, or the cargo or loading therein, sent by such vessels of merchandize, or by any person employed by such owners for the carriage of such letters according to their respective directions and delivered to the respective persons to whom they shall be directed, without paying or receiving, hire or reward, advantage or profit, for the same in any wise.

(f) Letters concerning goods or merchandize sent by common known carriers, to be delivered with the goods which such letters concern without hire or reward, or other profit or advantage for receiving or delivering such letters.

(g) No person, however, is authorised to make a collection of such excepted letters for the purpose of sending them in the manner above described; and any person so doing is liable to a forfeit of £5 for every letter, and of £100 for every week the practice is continued.

59. The following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a letter or to receive or collect or deliver a letter, although they shall not receive hire or reward for the same : -

(i) Common known carriers, their servants or agents, except a letter concerning goods in their carts or waggons, or on their pack horses.

(ii) Members of the Postal Department.

(iii) Owners, masters or commanders of ships, vessels, steamboats, or boats called or being passage or packet boats, sailing or passing coastwise or otherwise between ports or places within the limits to which "The Post Office Ordinance, 1890"

extends, except in respect of letters of merchants, owners of ships, or goods on board.

(iv) Passengers or other persons on board any such ships, vessels, steamboats, or passage or packet boats.

(v) The owners of, or sailors, watermen, or others on board a ship, vessel, steamboat or other boat, canoe, or barge, passing or re-passing on a river, lagoon, or navigable canal within the limits to which the "Post Office Ordinance, 1890"

Railway Companies are carriers and no letter may be sent by a Railway Company except in the mails of the Postal Department.

II. FOREIGN AND COLONIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

60. "Foreign and Colonial Correspondence" means correspondence passing in either direction between a place within the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria and a place outside it.

Foreign and Colonial Correspondence is divided into the following classes:-

(a) Letters.

(b) Post-cards.

(c) Printed Papers.

(d) Commercial Papers.

(e) Samples.

(f) Parcels.

A.—LETTER POST.

61. The prepaid rate of postage on letters from the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria is as follows :-

(i) On letters for the United Kingdom, British) 1d. per oz or. Possessions and Egypt) part thereof.

(ii) On letters for Foreign Countries, for the 1st. oz. and for every additional oz, or part thereof.

62. Letters posted unpaid or insufficiently prepaid are charged on delivery with double the deficiency.

63. No letter for a Colony or Foreign Country may exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

64. Coin, Watches, Jewellery or any article of Gold or Silver or any article liable to Customs duties cannot be sent by letter post.

65. If a letter received from abroad is suspected of containing jewellery or articles liable to Customs duties, it shall either be opened and examined in the presence of the adressee or his authorised representative and an officer authorised by the Collector of Customs and the duty (if any) paid, or be returned to the Country of Origin, whichever course the addressee may decide on.

B .- POST CARDS.

66. The prepaid rate of Postage on every Post-card for a destination outside the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria is 1d., and

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Foreign and Colonial Post-Printed and Commercial Papers.

on every reply Post-card 2d. A Post-card from a place abroad, if unpaid, is chargeable with a postage of 2d.; if partially paid, with double the deficient postage the surcharge in no case exceeding that on a wholly unpaid Post-card.

67. Cards used as Post-cards must be made of ordinary card-board not thicker than the material used for the thickest official Post-card and not thinner than the material used for the thinnest. They may not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length by $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in width or be less than 4 inches in length by 21 inches in width.

68. Reply-paid cards of private manufacture, must display the title "l'ost-card" on the address side, but this title is not obligatory for single cards of private manufacture. Reply halves of reply-paid cards must bear the words "Post-card" and "Reply."

69. A Post-card must not be folded, cut, or otherwise altered, nor may it be enclosed in a cover of any kind.

70. The right-hand half of the address side of a Post-card is in all cases reserved for the address of the recipient, for the postage stamp necessary for prepayment, which should so far as possible be placed in the upper right-hand corner, and for postal directions (such as "Registered," "Acknowledgment of Delivery," &c.); but the left-hand half of the address side as well as the back may be used by the sender for the purpose of a written communication, or may be otherwise disposed of, subject to the restrictions mentioned below.

71. Nothing may be attached to a Post-card except :-

(a) Stamps in payment of postage or stamp duty;

(b) A gummed label (not to exceed 2 inches long and $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch wide) bearing the name and address of the person to whom the card is sent:

(c) A similar label, bearing the name and address of the seader of the cards; and

(d) Engravings, illustrations, drawings and photographs on very thin paper and completely adherent to the card.

The articles specified in paragraphs (c) and (d) may be affixed either to the back or the left-hand half of the address side.

72. Cards addressed to certain countries which are referred to in the Imperial Post Office Guide, a copy of which is available for public use at each Post Office in the Colony and Protectorate, are still required to bear the title "Post-card," on the address side, and are not allowed to have photographs, &c., affixed to them.

73. If any of the foregoing rules relating to a Post-card be infringed, the card will be treated as a letter, unless it is eligible for transmission as a printed paper.

74. Reply halves are available for transmission to the country of origin, and to that country alone, provided that they were in the first instance received attached to the other half. If addressed to other countries they are treated as unpaid Post-cards. Ordinary international Postcards of one country posted in another are treated as unpaid Post-cards.

C.-PRINTED PAPERS AND COMMERCIAL PAPERS.

(i) POSTAGE AND DEFINITION.

75. The prepaid rate of postage on Printed Papers for all places abroad is 1d. per 2 oz., and on Commercial Papers is 21d., for the first 10 oz., and 1d. per 2 oz., thereafter.

Foreign and Colonial Post-Printed and Commercial Papers.

76. If only partly prepaid they will be chargeable on delivery with double the deficiency; if unpaid they will be stopped. Insufficiently prepaid Printed Papers from places abroad will be chargeable on delivery with double the deficiency, the surcharge in no case exceeding 1d. per 2 oz., and insufficiently prepaid Commercial Papers with double the deficiency, the surcharge in no case exceeding 5d. up to 10 oz., and 1d. per 2 oz. for heavier weights.

77. The articles which are entitled to be sent at the rate applicable to Printed Papers are mostly impressions or copies obtained upon paper, parchment, or card-board, by means of printing, lithography, engravings, photography, or any other mechanical process easy to

78. This description includes the undermentioned articles wholly printed:-Newspapers, books (stitched or bound), periodical works, pamphlets, sheet of music, visiting cards, address cards, proofs of printing, plans, maps, catalogues, prospectuses, announcements, circulars, notices, engravings, photographs, and designs.

79. Besides these articles, there are some others which, though not printed matter, are admitted, as for instance, manuscript intended for the press (when sent with the relative proof), papers impressed for the use of the blind, albums containing photographs, and cardboard drawing models stamped in relief.

80. Anything not being of glass, usually attached or belonging to any of the before-mentioned articles, in the way of binding, mounting, or otherwise and anything convenient for their safe transmission by post may also pass at the rate applicable to such articles, provided it is contained in the same packet.

81. The products of the copying press and typewriter are not admitted at the rate for printed papers; nor, as a rule, are printed papers, the text of which has been modified after printing, either by hand or by means of a mechanical process, or marked so as to constitute a conventional language.

82. The following exceptions to this rule are allowed:-

(a) Printed circulars may be dated in manuscript or by a mechanical process, and the signature of the sender, his trade or profession, and his address may be added. Corrections and insertions may be made in manuscript or by a mechanical process in relation to names of commercial travellers, dates of their journey, and the places they intend to visit, dates of departure of ships, names of person invited to meetings, and the place, date, and object of the meetings.

(b) On printed visiting cards, the address or title of the sender, or conventional initials, such as "p.p.c." may be written, and also good wishes, congratulations, thanks, condolences, or other formulas of courtesy expressed in not more than five

(c) Printers' proofs may be corrected in manuscript; additions which relate to accuracy, form, and printing may be made, and in case of want of space additional sheets may be used; the author's manuscript may be enclosed; printers' errors in other printed documents may also be corrected, and figures may be inserted or corrected in prices current, tenders for advertisement, trade circulars, prospectuses, and stock and share lists.

(d) Packets of books, papers, music, photographs, engravings, and Christmas and New Year cards may contain the invoices

relating to the articles sent; a book may have a presentation inscription written in it; and a Christmas and New Year card may be inscribed to the person for whom it is intended.

- (e) In forms of order or subscription for books, printed on cards, the works required or offered may be indicated in manuscript.
- (f) To cuttings from newspapers and periodical publications may be added in manuscript or by a mechanical process, the title, date, number and address of the publication from which the article is extracted.
- 83. Circulars which are in other respects admissible, but which are printed or lithographed in characters resembling those of the typewriter, or are produced by means of any mechanical process from typewritten originals, will be admitted at the rate for printed paper.
- 84. The undermentioned articles are excluded from transmission at the rate applicable to printed papers:-
 - (a) Postage Stamps, whether obliterated or not, and in general all printed articles constituting the sign of a monetary value;
 - (b) Blank paper, note paper or envelopes (with or without printed address), and all other articles of stationery pure and
 - (c) Commercial Papers comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications in the nature of letters, or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, Deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from Deeds under private seal written on stamped or unstamped paper, Way Bills, Bills of Lading, Invoices, and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of Insurance and other public Companies, all kinds of manuscript, Music, the Manuscript of Books and other literary works, and pupils' exercises with corrections, but without any comment on the work, and other papers of a similar description.
 - (d) If there is any mixture of Commercial and other Papers in the same packet the whole is treated as Commercial Papers.

(ii) LIMITS OF SIZE AND WEIGHT.

85. Packets of printed or Commercial Papers addressed to British Colonies or Possessions or to non-Union countries or colonies may not exceed 2 feet in length and 1 foot in width or depth; but for foreign countries in the Postal Union, the length is limited to 18 inches. Packets in the form of a roll may not in either case exceed 30 inches in length and 4 inches in diameter. The limit of weight is 5 lbs. for the United Kingdom, British Colonies or Possessions and for non-Union countries or colonies; and 4 lbs for foreign countries in the Postal Union,

(iii) MUST BE SENT OPEN.

S6. Printed Papers and Commercial Papers must be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in a cover which can be easily removed for the purpose of examination without breaking any seal, or tearing any paper, or separating any adhering surfaces. A packet posted without a cover may not be fastened or otherwise treated so as to prevent easy examination. It may, however, be secured with string.

Foreign and Colonial Post-Samples .- Parcels.

87. In order to secure the return of packets which cannot be delivered the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or

D .- SAMPLES.

(i) POSTAGE AND DEFINITION.

88. The prepaid rate of postage on Sample Packets for all places abroad is 1d, for the first 4 oz, and 4d, per 2 oz, thereafter. If only partly prepaid, they will be chargeable on delivery with double the deficiency; if unpaid, they will be stopped. Insufficiently prepaid Sample Packets from places abroad will be chargeable on delivery with double the deficient postage, the surcharge in no case exceeding 2d. up to 4 oz. and 1d. per 2 oz. for heavier weights.

89. The use of the Sample Post is restricted to (a) bona fide Trade Samples of Merchandise without saleable value, and (b) natural history specimens, dried or preserved animals and plants, geological specimens, and scientific specimens generally when sent for no commercial purpose. Packets containing goods for sale or consigned in execution of an order (however small the quantity), or articles sent by one private individual to another which are not actually trade samples or scientific specimens cannot be forwarded by Sample Post.

(ii) LIMITS OF SIZE AND WEIGHT.

90. Packets of samples addressed to the United Kingdom, British Colonies or Possessions or to non-Union countries may not exceed 2 feet in length and 1 foot in width or depth; packets for foreign countries in the Postal Union must not exceed 12 inches in length, 8 inches in width and 4 inches in depth. Packets in the form of a roll may not in either case exceed 12 inches in length and 6 inches in diameter. The limit of weight is 5 lbs. for packets of samples for the United Kingdom, British Colonies or Possessions and for non-Union countries or Colonies, but for foreign countries in the Postal Union the limit is 12 oz.

(iii). MODE OF PACKING AND ADDRESSING.

91. Samples must be sent in such a manner as to be easy of examination and, when practicable, must be sent in covers open at the end. In order to secure the return of packets which cannot be delivered, the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or written outside. There must be no writing or printing upon or in any sample packet for non-Union countries except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number, the price of the articles, the weight or size, and the quantity to be disposed of, or such as may be necessary to indicate the place of origin or the nature of the merchandise. A sample packet for a country in the Postal Union may contain, besides these particulars, any Printed Papers; and, if the rate applicable to Commercial Papers be paid, it may also contain Commercial Papers.

92. Deleterious liquids or substances and explosives are absolutely prohibited.

E.—PARCEL POST.

(i) POSTAGE, DIMENSIONS, AND WEIGHT.

93. The rates of postage on parcels for United Kingdom and British West African Colonies are as follows:-

of parcels (pars. 11 and 12 page 2) apply also to parcels for the above named places.

- 94. The rates of postage, maximum dimensions and weight for parcels vary in other countries and British Possessions. These various rates, &c., are shown in the Imperial Post Office Guide.
- 95. Foreign and Colonial parcels cannot be registered, but they may be insured under the conditions specified on page 21.
- 96. The sender of each parcel is required to make for Customs purposes upon a special form (which can be obtained at any Post Office) an accurate statement of the nature and value of the contents and other particulars.
- 97. Undervaluation of the contents or failure to describe them fully renders parcels liable to seizure, and the addressees to prosecution under the Customs Ordinance.

(ii) CUSTOMS DUTY AND CHARGES ON DELIVERY.

- 98. All parcels are liable to be opened for Customs examination; and their contents are subject to Customs duty according to the laws of the Colony and Protectorate.
- 99. The duty is ordinarily collected from the addressee on delivery but may be paid by the sender in the case of certain countries referred to in the Imperial Post Office Guide if the parcel be handed in either at Lagos, Calabar or Forcados Post Office.
- 100. The amount of Customs duty due on each parcel will be collected in postage stamps which must be affixed by the addressee to the Parcel Post Notification and Receipt Form before delivery of the parcel can be made.
- 101. The Customs Examining Officers have power to open and verify the declared value and contents of any parcel where there is reason for believing that the same have been wrongly stated but the parcel must afterwards be properly tied up and sealed with the Customs scal. Before any parcel can be so examined the addressee should be notified and the parcel examined in his presence or in the presence of his representative.
- 102. In Stations where there are no Customs Officials, the duties will be assessed and the parcels examined by the Postal Officers under the foregoing conditions.

(iii) PREPAYMENT.

103. The postage on Parcels must be fully prepaid.

(iv) PACKING AND SEALING.

- 104. No compensation is paid for damage to articles insufficiently packed.
- 105. For parcels containing liquids and substances which easily liquefy two receptacles must be used. Between the inner receptacle, which contains the liquid, and the outer one, which should be of strong wood or metal, space must be left all round, and this space must be filled with bran, sawdust, or other absorbent material.
- 106. Celluloid, unmanufactured or in sheets, must be well packed in strong wooden boxes, and articles composed wholly or partly of celluloid must be in a packing not less strong than stout card-board and the nature of the goods must be shewn on the parcel.

Foreign and Colonial Post-Prohibited Articles-Redirection.

107. A parcel for a Foreign Country should be so sealed by the sender that it cannot be opened without breaking the seals or leaving an obvious trace of violation. The seals should bear the impression of a private device of the sender.

(v) DELIVERY OF PARCELS.

108. Parcels are not, like letters, delivered at the residences of the addressees. Notice of the arrival of a parcel is sent to the addressee, who must claim it at the Post Office where it is lying.

(vi) REGULATIONS AS TO ALL PARCELS.

- 109. Where they are not in conflict with the foregoing rules, the general regulations of the Inland Parcel Post apply to Foreign and Colonial Parcels,
- (vii) COMPENSATION FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE OF UN-INSURED PARCELS.
- 110. The Postmaster-General will (not in consequence of any legal liability, but voluntarily, and as an act of grace) give compensation for the loss or damage of uninsured parcels sent by Parcel Post between this country and the United Kingdom, West African Colonies and other countries referred to in the Imperial Post Office Guide when such loss or damage takes place while the parcels are in his custody, and does not arise from any fault or neglect of the senders or from the nature of the contents. The compensation paid will in no case exceed £1,

F.-GENERAL POSTAL RULES.

A .- PROHIBITED ARTICLES.

- 111. The general regulations in regard to articles which may not be transmitted by the Internal Post apply also to the External Post. There are special prohibitions applicable to particular countries concerning which full information is given in the Imperial Post Office Guide.
- 112. No parcel is admissible which contains base or counterfeit coin, articles infringing trade mark or copyright laws, anything liable to become offensive or injurious through decay during the time ordinarily occupied in transmission, unless enclosed in a hermetically sealed tin, or any article or substance specially prohibited from importation into the country or colony to which the parcel is addressed. A list of such prohibitions is given in the Imperial Post Office Guide.
- 113. Coin, Watches, Jewellery, or any article of Gold or Silver cannot be sent by Parcel Post to any country included in the insurance system unless they are insured for at least a part of their value and packed and sealed in accordance with the special regulations found under the heading of Insurance (page 21).
- 114. Coin (unless clearly intended for purposes of ornament) or bullion exceeding £5 in value cannot be sent from this country to places abroad.
 - 115. Liquid celluloid cannot be sent by post.

27. Ibadan,-I gather that trade has been prosperous and well maintained.

28. Oyo.—Trade is reported as certainly improving and to have advanced considerably since 1906. It is confidently hoped that cotton exports will revive. The purchases in Oyo District by the British Cotton Growing Association for this quarter as compared with the similar period for last year are as follow:

October 1st to December 31st, 1907 19,992

Decrease 233,220 lbs.

29. It is evident however if the suicidal policy of paying only 3s. 4d. per lb. for cotton at Oyo is maintained, whilst 1d. per lb. is given at other stations, that the cotton industry will locally become practically extinguished. This matter was fully explained in my predecessor's last report.

30. Hesha.-The bulk of trade in this District continues to find its way to Oshogbo, the most northerly Railway Station in the Protectorate.

31. Oudo.—Trade is reported as being fairly good. Were a large Store started by some European Firm at Agbabu it would be a great boon to the natives and probably prove a good thing financially for the

32. Jebu-ode. -Trade normal but no new markets opened. The timber deadlock still continues. Crops have suffered somewhat from want of rain, but it is hoped that this "Harmattan" may remedy matters.

33. Badagry.-Trade reported as normal. One new market opened at Ajara-Bedo-a mile or two from Badagry.

34. Meko and Idiroko.—Nearly the whole trade consists in corn which is exported to Porto-Novo.

ROADS.

35. Abeokuta-Alake.-Road 26.96 chains reformation with 8 feet centre metalled.

Ijaiye.—Road 89 chains of new road constructed during the quarter. This is a new Road.

Meko.—Road 1817 chains repaired, 10 temporary bridges completed.

Kajola.—Road 42.5 chains formation, 566 repairs.

Oba.—Road 273 chains repairs.

Titi.—Road 107 chains repairs, 2 temporary bridges, 1 wooden drain box fixed.

Owowo.-Road 69 chains formation, 139 chains repairs.

36. Ibadan.—The Ibadan—Oyo Road is completed. The new road through Ibadan Town has not yet been finished. Repairs have been effected to other roads in the District.

37. Oyo.—The Oyo—Ibadan Motor Road is completed and in excellent condition.

Ovo-Isevin Road-13 miles constructed.

Ono-Ogbomosho Road .- 11 miles completed.

Afin Road.—requires the putting in of necessary culverts by Public Works Department.

38. Ilesha.—Oshogbo-Ilesha Motor Road—over 10 feet in width—is in course of construction. Patrol path along the entire Telegraph line is being progressed with width 41 feet.

39. Ondo.—Roads reported in good order—and free labour obtainable whenever necessary.

40. Jebu-Ode-The jebu Ode to Ibadan Road has not yet quite reached Aridi, the work of clearing being very heavy.

The Ibuda-Epo Road is nearly finished.

The Odogbolu Road is completed, a causeway having been erected across the swampy land on both sides of the Okomanyan River.

Jebu-Ode-Musin Road-A short cut of about 5 miles is now open. The old road however is better for cycling, being less hilly.

41. Badagry.—The Ayetoro and Igbogila Roads are progressing, but the District Commissioner reports only slowly.

42. Epc.-Roads maintained. No new ones started.

43. Ikorodu-Shayamu,-Nothing further reported by District Commissioner. Roads in good order.

44. Meko-Idiroko.—The Joffin-Meko Road—70% of this Road is reported as being negotiable by a bicycle, the remaining 30% requires expert advice, its condition being exceptionally bad and difficult to tackle.

45. Meko Roads have been cleared once a month.

WATERWAYS.

46. Abeokuta.—Nothing has been done. The Ogun River has been exceptionally dry.

47. Ikorodu-Shaqamu-No further clearing has been carried out in the Ikosi Creek.

48. Badagry.-The Yewa River requires clearing, and would prove useful for timber transport.

49. Jobu-Odc.—Streams reported clear, they being too rapid to allow of accumulations.

50. Up to full strength.

SANITARY.

51. Abeokuta.—The District Commissioner states that he has received no Sanitary report from the District Medical Officer, who presumably forwards it direct to Principal Medical Officer.

52, Ibadan,-Vaccination has been proceeded with, but Resident has given no details for quarter. Health generally good.

53. Oyo.-This is one of the best maintained Districts so far as Sanitary arrangements are concerned. The Town itself is an exceptionally clean one, and well laid out.

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54. Resha,-Conditions satisfactory. Health generally very good. Vaccination Returns sent direct to Principal Medical Officer.

55. Jebu-Ode. -- The Town is reported to be in better Sanitary condition than formerly, but both in it and in the outlying Districts diseases of the most hideous character are prevalent and render it dangerous for travellers to camp or even to halt for any length of time, as both flies and mosquitos abound-Small-pox has been practically stamped out, and Vaccination is fairly successfully carried on; but for general dirtiness and uncleanliness, the Jebus are evidently hard to beat,

56. Badagry.-No sickness of any importance reported.

57. Ikorodu-Shagamu,-No separate report submitted,

58. Meko.—Towns fairly cleanly kept. Vaccinations total 261-170 successful.

Idiroko-Water supply 17 miles distant. Wells are being sunk.

EDUCATION.

59. Absoluta.-No Government Schools. The Scholars at the Mission Schools took part in the competitive examination and Exhibition held at Lagos in December, last. Scholars of the Roman Catholic School were successful in obtaining prizes. The manners, it is noticeable, of the Roman Catholic Children are excellent, but those of certain other Missions require as yet much inculcation.

60, Ibadan.-No separate Reports. Education is progressing.

61. Ouo.-Nothing to add to last report.

62. Hesha.-There are no Government Schools. The Church Missionary Society and Wesleyans have Schools in most of the larger Towns. In Hesha Town the Mahommedans have one.

63. Ondo. - Nothing to add to last quarters report.

64. Epc.-No change.

65. Jebu-Odc.-The Schools seem to be run in a very undisciplined manner, chiefly on the part of the Schoolmasters. Very few Registers are kept, and those not up to date. Average attendance at Jebu Ode Christ Church School 387 out of a nominal roll of 100 children.

66. Badagry,-The average daily attendance at the undermentioned Schools in this District was as follows:-

> St. Thomas Government Moslem School

67. Royodu - Shagamu, -No further report.

68. Meko,-No Government School here. The Wesleyans have an elementary School. Average daily attendance 15 to 20.

69. Idiroko-There are no Schools here.

70. Lagos.—The Government School at Itebu in the Eastern District was re-opened with about 30 children and a new School started at Aboto in the same District.

Lantern Lectures on the United Kingdom were held at Ibadan in October.

Evening classes for teachers preparing for Certificate examination were fairly attended.

The Nineteenth Annual Exhibition of School work, and carpentry,-the latter from Bonny School, was held on December 14th. Total number of Exhibits was 1,296 as compared with 1,798 last year. None were sent in from Wesleyan Boys High School. Total value of prizes awarded was £63. 0. 6. in comparison with £74 3. 6. in the preceding year.

MISCELLANEOUS.

71. Absoluta.—Compensation to farmers occupying the land taken over for quarrying purposes has been

Mr. Darius Roberts has not been able to accomplish much yet in the way of "Pottery," but good clay has now been discovered and better results are anticipated.

72. Egbe Government.-Returns show :--

73. Oyo,-The Commissioner's Quarters are not yet completed. The Prison, which is in an unsuitable site is finished. The "spy-holes" in doors are useless. The Motor Garage, Post and Telegraph Offices are nearly finished.

74. Ilesha.-The Native Quarters and Prison require rebuilding, or entirely new lines erected: preferably the latter.

Postal Revenue for quarter amounted to £10. 11. 4. The sale of Postal Orders to £81. 7. 2.

75. Jebu-Ode.—The new Court House and out buildings have been satisfactorily completed.

76. Badagry.-The District Commissioner's Quarters will require overhauling and a new Court Room is under consideration.

The following extract is taken from the report on the Ikot-Ekpene District in which the District Commissioner, Mr. Hargrove, describes the light in which the Native Court is regarded by the

PRISONS.

47. At the end of the year there were 19 Prisons in the Eastern Province in which 10,519 prisoners were confined during the year, who have been chiefly employed on road-making, brick-making, mat and basket-making, sanitary work generally, etc. In Calabar Prison, a Tailoring Department is carried on.

The value of Prison labour is stated to be £15,419.

48. The general health appears to have been fairly good, and at Calabar, the following extract from the report of the Senior Medical Officer shews the improvement which has been effected in this res-

"The prison which for so many years has been a source of" "much anxiety to Medical Officers has ceased to be such."

"Beri-beri has vanished. Dysentery which was responsible" "for so many deaths has ceased in its epidemic form and only"

"sporadic cases now shew themselves."

49. A night school has been started at Calabar for the Prison Staff which has been well attended and the Staff generally take a very deep interest in the instruction imparted to them, the benefits of which are already noticeable.

POLICE.

50. The authorized establishment was 340, all ranks and the actual strength at the end of year 333. This number includes one Assistant Commissioner of Police at Lagos (shortly expected) one temporarily transferred to the Central Province, and one on leave. The strength shews a reduction of 40 in comparison with the establishment of previous year, due to the taking over by the Prison Department some of the duties in connection with the Gaols, formerly performed by constables. The Police Department still continues to mount guards on Prisons at Out-stations.

The actual number of Constables who fired the prescribed course was 96, the results being as follow:-

Marksmen 2, 1st Class 25, 2nd Class 10, 3rd Class 59. The average score was :4.46.

52. The total number of prosecutions instituted in the Police and District Courts throughout the Province was 2,337 resulting in 1,689 convictions, and 595 dismissals, leaving a balance of 53 awaiting trial at Assizes. Of the above total, 2,162 cases were tried summarily, and 175 were committed to Assizes.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

53. Inspections under the Weights and Measures Ordinance have been made by the Commissioner of Police throughout the Province during the year, and Certificates of Justness issued as they became due.

Altogether 113 Certificates were issued, and the sum of £46 4s. 3d. collected and paid into Revenue. This amount is smaller than that realized during the previous year, though the number of inspections was much larger, owing to reduced scales of fees laid down in the Schedule under the new Ordinance, which came into force on the 31st March, 1908. No prosecutions were instituted during the year.

POSTAL.

54. The Post Offices in the Eastern Province are at Calabar, Opobo, Bonny, Brass and Akassa.

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There are Postal Agencies at Duke Town, Creek Town, Itu, Ikot-Ekpene, Owerri, Afikpo, Eket, Bakana, Buguma, Opobo Town, and Oron, the agents of which receive remuneration varying between £6 to £24 per annum. Also at Obubra, Bende, Ikom, Aba and Norah Beach, (Opobo), the duties at these latter stations being performed by members of the native staff as part of their ordinary work. Stamps are also on sale at Aro-Chuku, Ibi, Okigwi and Ikang.

A postal agent is stationed at Nsokpo for the purpose of forwarding mails between Bonny and Inland Stations.

A small launch service was established between Calabar and of Creek Town and has been of considerable advantage to residents both Stations.

Savings Bank business was established during the year and 124 deposit accounts were opened representing a total deposit of £1,810. Thirty-one accounts were however closed and the sum of £372 including interest, withdrawn.

During the year the rate of Postage on Inland Parcels was increased to 7d., 11d., and 1s. 3d. for parcels weighing 3 lbs., 7 lbs., and 11 lbs. respectively.

59. The cash on delivery system was introduced during the year, an arrangement whereby senders of postal packets exchange between the United Kingdom and the Colony can have the value of contents collected from the recipients and remit to them by Money Order or Postal Orders. It is however premature to express an opinion as to what extent the public will avail themselves of the system which, for the present, is confined in this Province to Calabar only.

61. The Cables over the Cross River, Opobo River and Andoni River have been renewed and are now in satisfactory order.

62. The work of clearing the line in forest area has made good progress and interruptions have not been numerous and were speedily adjusted.

63. The extension of telegraph line from Ikot-Ekpene to Bende was commenced on 10th November and completed by end of the year to Erriam, a distance of 14 miles, leaving 22 miles to reach Bende. Very creditable work, considering only one European Foreman supervised it.

64. A Telephone Exchange has been inaugurated at Calabar and during the year 26 Government Offices and 7 Private Firms bave been connected.

There remain 9 more private subscribers to be connected in 1909, which work should be completed early in February.

EDUCATION.

During the half-year 13 Government Schools in the Eastern Province were inspected and examined, and 9 surprise visits paid.

There is still a lack or properly qualified teachers in the Government Schools. The necessity of staffing schools with Pupil Teachers where they have no means of obtaining instruction enabling them to pass their examinations, necessarily tends to limit the number of qualified teachers.

Sewing classes for the girls have been started at Oban by Mrs. Talbot and are much appreciated.

FORESTRY AND AGRICULTURE,

The following extract is taken from the half yearly report of the Provincial Forest Officer, Eastern Province.

"Regeneration of Forests:-Natural regeneration-The great bar to any-"thing like normal regeneration is the native rotation system of farming. "Afforested land is dis-afforested every year for fresh cultivable areas. Even where standards are left standing their natural regenerative tendency is nullified by a return to the same area for cultivation in four or five years when all the new growth is cleared for farming purposes. The attention of "Administrative Officers has been drawn to the Rule relating to Timber Section "48. The rigorous application of this section is sufficient to ensure better "natural regeneration. The Honourable Provincial Commissioner, Eastern "Province has emphasized my efforts with administrative Officers regarding the "stringent application of this section to minimise wasteful felling and protect " regenerating standards and the resultant vegetation therefrom."

"Plantation regeneration:-A large quantity of Elacis guineensis seed " (soft shell) has been distributed and a large quantity has been collected for "distribution to be transplanted. A large quantity of Para seed has been distributed to Executive Officers for the creation of nurseries by Forest "Guards to eventually increase the size of district plantations which will eventually become seed-distributing centres for rubber reafforesting favourable localities. The Para seeds sold to natives especially in the Opobo "District will materially increase the size of their plantations with the active " transplanting assistance of Forest Guards at District Headquarters, 5,430

" sold to enterprising native chiefs. Reports received regarding these are most

"favourable shewing a survival of 90 per cent. A large number raised in nursery beds and toughened by the removal of all shades remained available.

"Orders for these were pouring in very rapidly especially from Bonny and "Opobo chiefs. Active enquiries regarding the condition of all Para plantations, both Government and Private were made through Excecutive Officers and

" Forest Guards were and are busy in collecting the necessary information."

Action is proceeding with regard to the proposed Forest Reserve in the Oban

The 5,000 Para Rubber trees in the Garden Extension Calabar, are growing vigorously and the old Para Rubber trees in the Garden hollow have flowered profusely and are seeding well.

The Dichopsis gutta has also flowered profusely thereby establishing its indentity beyond doubt in the opinion of the Provincial Forest Officer, but unfortunately the fruit has fallen before coming to maturity.

1,350 Para seeds and 312 Cocoa seeds have been issued.

Over 1,000 Ponciana Regia have been planted along roads in Calabar.

There are 29 Nipa Palms on the opposite side of river doing remarkably well and 60 Sago palms in the Garden hollow in a flourishing condition.

With the exception of the Pomegranate, the introduced plants from the Straits Settlements are doing well.

The Stock Farm at Calabar has been closed owing to the adverse report of the Veterinary Surgeon on the Canary bull and cow for breeding purposes; both of these animals have been sold.

In the Oban District a collection of the Flora of the country has been started and detailed drawings of over 700 varieties made so far as possible with fruit as well as flowers from which it is hoped that colour studies may be prepared later. In this work Mr. Talbot, Acting District Commissioner, has been largely assisted by Mrs. Talbot and Miss Dixon. These ladies have also made excellent marmalade from bitter oranges locally grown.

The Cash on Delivery system is becoming popular; the addressees with a few exceptions take delivery of the parcels and pay all dues without much trouble to this Office. 146 Cash on Delivery Parcels and Registered packets were received during the past half year and a revenue of £2 13 8d. realized from payment of

The Franking note system was also introduced at the beginning of the current year and it enables the senders of parcels posted in the United Kingdom to defray, at the time of posting, all Customs and other charges payable in Southern Nigeria and so effect a free delivery of the parcels to addressees.

TELEGRAPHS.

Clearing of telegraph lines in the Eastern Province has been actively continued to provide a uniform width of 100 feet under the supervision of the Telegraph Department and District Commissioners.

The heaviest work which had to be undertaken was on the Section between Calabar and Uwet the line passing through dense forest. The work accomplished may be summarized as under:-

Calabar—Odukpani.—Clearing widened to 100 feet.

Odukpani-Mbarakom.-Clearing widened to 100 feet and 6 feet patrol path made for 51 miles from Odukpani and various bridges erected.

Mbarakom-Uwet.-Clearing widened to 100 feet and 6 feet patrol path made for 21 miles.

Uwet-Brickfields.-Clearing widened to 100 feet.

Brickfields-Itu.-Clearing widened to 30 feet for 3 miles from Brickfields.

Itu—Oguta. } Line cleared from falling timber.

A number of interruptions have occurred which, with few exceptions, were due to falling trees during clearing operations; now that tree felling is practically finished, communication should be maintained without much difficulty. Between April and June only eight instances occurred where communication was interrupted for over four hours and in each case was restored the same day.

Cables have worked without interruption.

A duplicate wire was creeted from Eket to Ikorobo ($10\frac{1}{2}$ miles) to connect up the existing line to Oron which was completed on June the 30th and the Oron office was re-opened on July 1st. A portion of the Itu Ikot-Ekpene line has been transferred to the new road for a distance of one mile from Itu.

The construction of Ikot-Ekpene-Erriam-Bende line commenced on November last, was continued and 36 miles approximately completed, the Telegpaph Office at Bende being opened on April 9th.

Mr. Hebden arrived in the Province at the beginning of June to superintend the construction of the line from Bende to Afikpo and Abakaliki.

TRANSPORT.

Cross River Transport Service. For the half year ending 30th June, 6,042 passengers and 3,345 tons of cargo were carried as compared with 7,356 passengers and 1,318 tons of cargo for corresponding period last year. Gross earnings being £1,658 18s. 9d. as compared with £1,091 1s. 5d. for previous half year.

The three months of the year very little transport was done as the

The Motor Canoe Service was maintained from Itu to the upper parts of the Biver throughout the Dry Season although difficulty was experienced owing to one of the Motor canoes being handed over for Military use, thus throwing all the mail work on one canoe. This should be obviated next year as by next dry season the third motor cance allowed for in 1908 will probably be available,

Messrs, Elder, Dempster & Company are now running a regular Cross River Transport Service. In addition to this Messrs, Miller Brothers, now have their own powerful launch and large lighters and do their own transport. Furthermore the African Association's S.S. "Ibeno" also runs to Itu fortnightly all the year round. The bulk of cargo and passengers do not go beyond Itu. It will easily be recognized that these outside firms carry much cargo and many passengers which would otherwise be carried by Government craft,

Under these circumstances it is improbable that the £5,000 estimated for this year under "Receipts from Cross River Transport Service" will be realized.

Bonny-Opobo and Bonny-Akassa Transport Service have worked well, but much extra work is thrown on the Bonny-Akassa Mail Launches through the new weekly home Mail Service.

WATERWAY CLEARING.

The clearing of the Imo River was continued under Lieutenant Wilson in January and February and most of the worst snags which had accomulated during the previous wet season removed between Akwete and Ihi which is as far as the river is navigable, a distance of 150 miles from the sea. It takes trading canoes three weeks from Opobo to reach Ihi during the dry season and over a month in the wet

The upper Sombriero River has been cleared by Licutenant Henderson to Ikri, 21 miles above Ahoada and is now navigable to this point by the largest canoes in all seasons.

The channel on the Otamini river is now cleared to within 6 miles of Owerri and is navigable for large canoes as far as Omoka about 20 miles from its junction with the Imo River. Smaller canoes can be taken 8 miles further.

The clearing of the Eastern Aboyne by Lieutenant Burn was resumed in March and continued to the end of the season, 19 miles having been cleared and since the water rose canoes have been able to reach a point 10 miles below the Abakaliki Crossing. A lot of work remains to be done on this waterway before the down river journey can be undertaken with safety by canoes owing to the rapidity of the current.

12 miles of the Moya river, which joins the Ewayong river opposite to Ogomogom have been cleared by Lieutenant Burn.

The opening up of a channel between the Cross River and the Kwa Ibo River has made good progress under Lieutenant Martin, and when work had to be suspended in April owing to the rise of water, 1705 yards of canal had been dug 15 feet wide and 5 feet deep and the course, which the canal is to follow, cleared 80 feet wide to join the Ibeno Creek and it is hoped that this season a steel cance or perhaps a small pinnace may be able to get through.

Henshaw Creek between the Cross River and Kwa River and the Ikang Creek have also been cleared and are now navigable with safety for launches.

Good work has been done under the Supervision of the District Commissioner, Ogoja, clearing the Aya river from Ogoja to Bansara. A few large snags remain which will have to be blown up when the water falls.

26. The authorized establishment was 386, as against 340 for the previous year, and the actual strength on the 31st December, 1909, 379. These numbers include one Assistant Commissioner on leave, one invalided, and one Assistant Commissioner under strength.

Including Provincial Headquarters, Calabar, the Force is distributed over 26 Stations. This shews an increase of 3 stations during the year, Itu, Oron, and Abak: at the two last named places however, the detachments consist only of two men at present.

Thirty extra constables were drafted to Abakaliki and Ikom to relieve the military garrisons at those stations.

292 men underwent the annual course of musketry, an increase of 196 over 1908. The target register shows the following results :-

Marksmen 9, 1st Class Shots 69, 2nd Class 37, 3rd Class 177. The average score was 45.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

27. The Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures made inspections under the Ordinance in the Calabar, Cross River and Bonny Divisions. The total number of Certificates of Justness issued was 96, in respect of which the sum of £23 16s. 6d. was collected in fees, and paid to Revenue.

LICENSED PREMISES.

28. The various stores and shops licensed to sell spirits were generally well conducted, and the hours of closing carefully observed. Only 6 convictions for contravention of the Spirit Licence Ordinance were obtained throughout the Province during the year.

POST OFFICE.

No new post office was established in this Province during the year but provision has been made and arrangements practically completed for the opening of one at Itu.

Postal agencies now exist at all stations in the Cross River and a large amount of postal business transacted, the principal agencies being those at Ikot-Ekpene, Itu, Oron, Afikpo, Owerri
